Chaldean community plans cultural center in W. Bloomfield

While members of metro Detroit's Chaldean community continue to Americanize, they don't want to forget their roots.

They want to forever treasure their heritage and traditions with plans to build a Chaldean Cultural Center on the grounds of the Shenandoah County Club in West Bloomfield.

"It's something we've been talking about for a long time," said West Bloomfield's Jacob Bacall, president of the Chaldean Iraqi-American Asso-ciation of Michigan (CIAAM).

"We need a place to display a collection of artifacts to give our community and the community at-large – a chance to appreciate our culture."

CIAAM purchased the
Shenandonh Country Club on
Walnut Lake Road near Drake
in 1990. Ownership of the public
golf course and banquet facilities
at Southfield Manor is shared by
739 Chaldean families, which
pay membership dues to
CIAAM.

Shenandoah, built on 147 acres in the 1950s, has an 18-hole golf course, a small club house and a for-rent banquet hall that holds up to 300 people.

In the coming weeks, Birming-ham architect Victor Saroki will present plans to the West Bloomfield Planning Commis-sion to construct a large cultural center with a museum, lecture hall and conference areas.

hall and conference areas.

They also plan to build an out-door swimming pool, a fitness center, a new club house, a members-only restaurant, a public restaurant and more banquet facilities. After the new facilities are built, they plan to raze the existing building for additional parking spaces.

It's premature to estimate the exact square footage and costs, Saroki said, until the township

permit process is complete.

"We hope to begin construction in the fall if all goes well," said Saroki, who added construction will take roughly 18 to 24 months.

West Bloomfield resident and west bloomisid resident and businessman Johnny Karmo said CIAAM has been forming committees to brainstorm ideas and develop goals for the multi-million-dollar project since 1997.

Today, Bacall said 110,000 of the nation's 125,000 Chaldeans live in metro Detroit, most in West Bloomfield, Farmington Hills, Southfield and Oak Park.
