She secred 14 points in a 59-49 win at Albion College and 26 points in a 79-62 win over Adrian College.

Valade made 16 of 25 field goals and 10 of 10 free throws. She also grabbed 11 rebounds and had three assists, two blocks and one steal.

This is the second time this season Valade has earned the MIAA Player of the Week honor. She shared the latest award with Laura Poppema of Hope College.
