The individual event took place at the Dearborn fee Skating Center Jan. 13. Skatters competed at their test level individually against skaters in their district. The top two skaters in each level, from each district, advanced to the championship own in Birmingham.

All Farmington team members who have met the requirements will receive a school letter. Even though only Farmington and North Farmington high schools are represented on the team, interested skaters from Harrison are encouraged to come out for the team next year. Each school will be given information about the team in September.
