CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE Notice of Adoption of Ordinance C-2-01, an Ordinace to amend the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 27, Subdivision of Land, relating to standards for storm water retention areas in plate and site condominium. A full copy of this Ordinance is on file in the Clerk's Office for public review and inspection.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section J.
The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 27, Subdivision of Land, Article IV, "Improvements," Section 27-83, "Utilities," is hereby amended to add a new peragraph (40, which will read as follows:

(4) Storm water retention areas shall be provided for all subdivision plasm and site condominium plans, subject to the following:

a. Open water retention hasins shall not be located on a lot or condominium site that is to be used for one-family residential.

open water retention to that is not to declared to a fact or condominium site that is to be used for one-family residential Side alopes below storage elevation of water retention areas located in one-family residential audicinions shall not exceed one (1) vertical to six (6) horizontal.

A landscape plan shall be submitted for water retention areas. The plan shall be submitted for water retention areas. The plan shall be submitted with the preliminary plan and shall be arranged in accordance with the applicable Landscape Design Principles adopted by the Flanning Commission.

The minimum distance between the freeboard line of the constitution and say existing or proposed property line of a one-family residential use shall be fifteen (15) feet. This distance may be reduced by the Flanning Commission provided that, the areas est aside is equal in aguars feet to the area that would have been required by fifteen (15) feet.

Adequate access to the water retention area shall be provided for maintenance purposes.
