There's more. Fabulous orchids and living topiaries in a variety of shapes and sizes, including hearts, caught my eye. Candles, dried and silk arrangements, topiaries and wreaths are just a few of the other items.

Now back to the arrangement in the window. St. Patrick's Day is Saturday. Instead of the anti-ipated shamrock, why not look into the various shades of green that are available now and perk up your home with a different flower for the holiday! I predict lots of oohs and ahs will be heard.

Both bolls-of-Ireland, Moluc-cella, and amaranthus, Amaran-thaceae, are annuals and can be grown in our Michigan gardens. You can plant the seed directly in the ground a few weeks before the last frost date—they need a

little chilling. Our last frost date is about the middle of May. "Bells" grow well in full sun to light shade and poor to average, well-drained soil. They also like sandy soil

sandy soil.

There are several varieties of There are several varieties of amaranthus. Probably the most recognizable is love-lies-bleeding. A. caudatus. The bush can reach 5 feet, so give it room to grow. It likes full sun to partial shade and evenly moist, average

soil.

The deep red or green tassellike clusters of flowers appear from summer to early fall.
