Letdown costly for Marian

After a sensational month-long run that netted Catholic League, district and regional championships, the Mustangs magical season ended in surprisingly swift fashion in a Class A state quarterfinal match at Welled Lake Central High School.

The Mustang fans barely had enough time to settle in before they knew what hit them. Macomb County power Fraser eliminated Marian (39-11-2) with a two-game sweep that stunned nearly everyone in attendance.

After dropping a close opener, the Mustangs never found a rhythm in the second game and watched their season come to close by 16-12, 16-1 score.

Marian coach Stephanie Storen said her team just never got on track.

The Mustangs regrouped and fought back to tie the game at 8-1 all after Katherine Woch served for four straight points.
The match went back-and-forth for the next few minutes
