Briggs, the former Schoolcraft All-America who once scored 60 points in a junior college game and led the Southwest Conference in scoring at Baylor, has transformed a dying program.
Coaches like Ron Hall, Rocky Watkins (Briggs former coach), Bob Wetzel, Dave Bogataj and Glen Donahue tried thoir best, but Briggs has surpassed all expectations at Six Mile and Haggerty roads after arriving from a Toxas high school.
And I have a true confession to make.

Briggs, who I had known as a
player, called and asked me
about the Schoolcraft job. I tried
to persuade him not to take it.
I felt at the time that the
Schoolcraft administration was-

n't committed to building a suc-cessful basketball program.

But give athletic director Ed Kavanaugh credit for hiring

But give athletic director Ed Kavanaugh crodit for hiring Briggs and women's coach Karen Lafata (whose team is also head to the Division II NJCAAs). Kavanaugh was a winner at Livonia Ladywood girls basketball program and believed bethe coaches were good fits.

Of course, the Schoolcraft administration deserves credit for allowing Briggs the opportunity to succeed. They have made some moves that have to be applauded.

Back-up guard Javon Clark (Detroit Cass Tech), who did not play in the Region or District games, is still receiving treatment from trainer Kim Kolewski for a sprained ankle. He is the

team's top three-point shooter (46.3 percent).
Five Ocelots average double figures in points led by 6-8 center Sam Hoskin (24.6), followed by Derrick Bird (19.8), Dave McGlown (11.5), Nick Evoln (10.7) and Mike Peck (10.3).
The top rebounders include Hoskin (10.0) and Dwight Windom (8.2). The team's top field goal percentage shooter is Win-

dom (61.7 percent) followed by Evola (61.4 percent). Peek is the team's top free throw shooter (62.1 percent).

McGlown, the point-guard from Pontiac Notre Dame Prepvin Florida A&M, tops in the team in both assists (7.3 per game) and steals (92 total).

The Ocelots have outscored their opponents by an average of 106.3 to 76.6.



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
