That Brown has such an interest in motorsports is not surprising since he has followed in the footsteps of his father. Jeff Brown, who has been involved in racing since he was a youngster in 1961.

A former national champion on the go-cart circuit, Jeff also raced Indy cars and motorcycles, competing against the likes of Michael Andretti and Al Unser
