Jury convicts in Farmington Hills man's death BY DAN WEST STAFF WRITER dwest@oo.hon

An Onkland County Circuit County Jury Friday returned a verdict of voluntary manslaugh-ter in the trial of 20-year-old Jason Shepherd of Warren. A second day of deliberations brought the decision from the 12-person jury. Shepherd had been charged with second-degree murder for driving his car into Ayad Salmo, 28, of Parmington Hills in the parking lot of West Bloomfield's Orchard Mall last May 7.

Hills in the parking lot of West Bloomfield's Orchard Mall last May 7. Salmo died in a Pontice hospi-tal four daya later. Seatencing for Shepherd is set for May 9 in the court of Judge Gene Schnelz. Voluntary manslaughter is punishable by up to 15 years in prison. The four-day trial concluded at 2:30 p.m. Thursday and jury deliberations began at that time. Prosecuting and defense attor-neys agreed with many of the details presented in the testimo-ny but differed over Shepherd's state of mind when he drove his state of mind when he drove his pockey in the mall's parking lot. "We feel there is no adequate justification for what he did," Assistant County Prosecutor Greg Townsend said. "With his actions, he (Shepherd) created a high risk that someone could get seriously hurt or killed and that meets the criteria for second-

degree murder." Defonse attorney Larry Kaluzny said Shepherd regret-tod the unfortunate accident and did not intend to kill anyone. "He was going to work and not looking for any trouble," Kaluzny said, "He was panick-ing, nervous and fearing for his life because he was attacked, hit with a hockey stick and his car was dented." According to witnesses, Shep-herd was reporting for his work shift at Hiller's shortly before midnight while a docan men

Area was reporting for his work shift at Hiller's shortly before midnight while a dozen men were playing hockey in the park-ing lot in front of the store. Truu-ble began when the game ball, two players, Shepherd and his car all came together at once. Shepherd, Kaluzny said, did not see the ball but saw two men running toward his car, so be hit his brakes. open the store doors to let him in. While he waited, some of the hockey players — who interpret-ed Shepherd's driving through the parking lot as a threat — confronted him. Shepherd got out of his car and a fight ensued. "There's different views about who threw the first punch," Kaluzny said, "but the police recovered a broken hockey slick, broken headlight glass and found fresh dents in his car." After an initial confrontation, the hockey players were walking away when Shepherd climbed
