At the beginning of the school year, Goss explained, letters were sent home with students explaining that random parking lot searches could occur for no

explaining that random parking lot searches could occur for no reason at any time. There also are signs posted in the high schools parking lot that vehicles can be searched if there is reasonable cause to do so.

"This is a deterrent consistent with the schools' policy on zero tolerance," Goss said.

So, with spring break just around the corner, Farmington High School Principal John Bartett decided the time was right for a search. He emphasized there was nothing specifically triggering the look-see.

"It was just to let kids know we're trying to maintain a safe and drug-free environment," the principal explained. "Around apring time, kids begin to become a little more anxious to 'grow up' and do things. But there was no incident we were reacting to."

The specially trained canines found small or traceable amounts in four cars while an apparatus used to smoke marijuana was discovered in a fifth, Goss shal.

All of the students received school subgensions of from three-to-10 days, and received misdemenor tickets, which carry maximum penalties of 93 days in juil and \$500 fine. Barrett said one of the students attends Farmington Alternative Academy, a case of being parked "in the wrong place at the wrong time."

Goss said those ticketed for marijuana possession included two 17-year-old females, one 17-year-old male, and one 16-year-old female, Another female, 18, was ticketed for having narcetics paraphernalia. Their hearings are set for Mondey, April 23, in 47th District Court.

The student drivers of three of the five targeted vehicles were brought out from inside the school after police dogs "alerted"

officers that there might be drugs present, Goss explaired. Under state law, such alerts are enough for a complete search to take place, he added.

Two of the students subsequently were handcuffed and taken to the Farmington police station for processing and then were discharged.

Goss said officers opened fourth vehicle, after spotting a marijuana seed. The smoking apparatus was discovered under the front seat of a fifth car.

Although he said the results of the search "doesn't indicate there's a serious problem, ... this is a drug-free zone and we mean it. And that's a good message to get out."
