

Falcons earn 4-0 win over Hawks

Senior midfielder Lorianne DeDomenico is usually the player distributing the ball for the Farmington High girls soccer team, but she was on the finishing end Monday night.

DeDomenico scored 75 percent of her team's goals, leading Farmington to a 4-0 victory over host Farmington Harrison.

"We're always hoping she can score," Falcons coach Steve Montgomery said. "She has good shot and good possession skills. She's usually calm under pressure, and that's what you need to be a good scorer."

Farmington led 1-0 at halftime following a DeDomenico goal with 17 minutes remaining in the half.

Junior Julie Gottlicher scored the other goal, beating two defenders with one-on-one moves followed by the goalie before chipping the ball into the net.

Freshman goalkeeper Katie Johnson earned her second shutout, making seven saves. The Falcons outshot the Hawks overall, 25-12.

"We were in control of the game for the most part," Montgomery said, adding the percentage of possession time was about 70-30 in favor of Farmington.

"(The Hawks) had their

chances when they could have scored, but either Molly Jud or Shauna Barkume came through and took the ball.

"The defense played well, but we're still licking our wounds from the last two games (with Grasse Pointe North and Trenton)."

"I'm reasonably satisfied with what they did. We had to pass the ball around more than we like. At times Harrison had us under pressure, but we were able to get the ball out."

Forward Beth Kolacki didn't play much in the second half due to injury, and midfielder Erica Rose was able to play despite a strained hamstring muscle.

"Julie Gottlicher played a great second half and she stepped up her play," Montgomery said. "Lorianne, Erica and Julie really controlled the midfield and made a lot of key passes."

Barkume and Erin Dorco controlled the middle defensively, he added, while Maggie Vuillancourt and Jud did a great job as marking backs. Becky Bolting played the last 15 minutes in goal.

Farmington is 3-1 overall and 1-0 in the Western Lakes Activities Association.

CHURCHILL 1, N. FARMINGTON 0: Despite the loss to visiting Lodi Churchill, North coach Tim Russell was pleased with the way the Raiders competed against one of the WLA's best teams.

"We played a great game," he said. "We've never had a situation where we played a Division I team and actually outplayed them."

"We played a little scared in the first half and, as a result, we gave up a goal we shouldn't have. In the second half, we were all over them."

"We played them 1-0 last year, but we were totally on our heels the whole game. This year we generated quite a bit of offense. True, we were not able to finish, but we had a lot of good opportunities. It was a big step up for our program."

Lauren Hogan and Sarah Jakob pressured the Churchill defense, according to Russell. Meghan Callahan, Catherine Munaco and Joyce Chung were standouts in the midfield, "not just stopping Churchill but delivering the ball into the offensive end," Russell said.

Defensively, the Raiders (2-2) were led by Danielle Navas, Melissa Navas and Michele Boothroy, who played her best game at sweeper, according to Russell. Goalie Anne Muir had a great game, he added.

"We played a lot of defense early," Russell said. "It was like we were playing a team with a name instead of playing to the best of our ability."

"Once they got a goal, the game changed and we started playing to our ability. If we hadn't started the game on our heels, it would have been a totally different game."

MARIAN 3, MERCY 0: The Marlins finished the pre-Easter portion of their schedule with a fourgame winless streak after losing Tuesday to the visiting Mustangs.

The spring break also comes at a good time for the Marlins, who were missing seven players due to injury, including five starters.

"The players we put in worked really hard," Mercy coach Tanis Macleice said. "A lot of people who are injured are our leaders, too."

The Ventures, who scored two goals on penalty kicks, were scoreless for most of the first half but took a 1-0 lead at halftime.
