"We want to encourage some others who might want to get their picture up there. It's a motivating thing and an appreciative thing to those who brought a lot of honor to the school and the community."

Call organized a committee last October that included Catherman, Young, former district athletic directors Jack Cotton and Ron Holland, school principal John Barrett, assistant principal Bob Crawford, current

athletic director Brian Swinehart and sports boosters Linda Wantin, Janet Szopo and Dave Kensonson.

The committee, which produced a list of 20 names and narrowed it to five in January, had three basic criteria: the athlete had to be out of school at least 10 years, had to have lettered in the sport they were being inducted and had to have an outstanding accomplishment in that sport.

"We wanted it to be a very select group," Call said. "We didn't want to take in a whole lot the first time. We wanted to keep it around five."

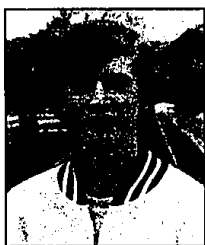
Call said the committee considered several other names and will plan to meet every year for the purpose of possibly adding others.

"Some years there may not be any," he said. "We want it to be a best of the best. We still have the Wall of Fame for anybody who makes all-state or All-American."

Call said all five inductees will be at the ceremony Thursday when the ceremony takes place at 7 p.m. in the school auditorium.

The event will occur in conjunction with the presentation of the winter scholar-athlete awards, and the program will include a 20-minute video highlighting the sports achievements of the five athletes.

Cawley lives in California, but his business travels will enable him to be in Michigan this week. Durham is an Oklahoma resident; McGuire and Maier call Ann Arbor home and coach at the University of Michigan, and

Churella lives in nearby Novi.

"I think it's a great honor, and I'm very pleased to be one of the inductees, especially for the inaugural class," Churella said. "It's unusual that a high school actually develops a hall of fame, so I think it's a wonderful honor."

Catherman and Young will provide narrative during the film presentation. The athletes' former coaches will introduce and present them with commemorative plaques.

The Hall of Fame will be situated along the wall opposite the gymnasium. The display will feature four columns and three arches framing photos of the athletes.

"It's going to be very dramatic," Call said. "It will be like something you haven't seen at any other school."

In high school, he was a six-time state champion, winning the 120-yard high hurdles and 180 low hurdles in '58 and '59 and the long jump in '59; he also anchored the winning 880 relay team as a senior. Farmington was 30 yards behind when Cawley took the baton; he caught all the runners ahead of him and won the race in what Call said is still considered one of the greatest track-and-field feats in state history.

Cawley is a manufacturers rep and lives in Yorba Linda, Calif.

NATE DURHAM: Class of 1972. Durham was the first pole vaulter in the state of Michigan to clear 15 feet and won the Class A state championship as a senior. He was all-state in track and gymnastics; in the latter state meet, he was fifth in the all-around and third on the trampoline.

Durham attended Florida State University and had a career-best and school-record vault of 28-4 1/2. He was on the U.S. national team and went to the Olympic Trials in 1980. Durham is a sales manager for a conditioning equipment company and lives in Altus, Okla.

MIKE MCGUIRE: Class of 1974. McGuire was twice an All-American and an All-American in cross country as a high school senior. In track, he won the Class A state championship in the two-mile run with a record time of 9:12 as a junior; he was the runner-up in his senior year with a 9:24 time. He won the 1974 Midwest Meet of Champions.

At the University of Michigan, McGuire was an All-American in cross country and track. He was the Big Ten indoor three-mile champion and record-holder. He was a member of the U.S. cross country team in the world championships, and he won the Detroit Free Press Marathon in 1981.

McGuire lives in Ann Arbor and is head coach of the UM women's cross country team and an assistant with the women's track team. He was voted Big Ten Coach of the Year in cross country twice.

MARK CHURELLA: Class of 1975. Churella was an all-state and All-American wrestler while at FHS, winning the Class A championship at 155 pounds and going undefeated in his senior year. He was second at 155 as a junior and third at 138 as a sophomore. He was the U.S. Wrestling Federation national junior champion in 1975. Churella earned three varsity letters in football. An offensive guard and defensive end, he won the Lombardi Award as Farmington's outstanding lineman and all-league honors as a senior.

At the University of Michigan, Churella won two Big Ten wrestling titles and

three NCAA championships — the first two at 150 and the third at 167. He was third in the nation as a freshman. He was the junior world champion in 1977. He is a member of the state of Michigan and national wrestling halls of fame.

Churella was the head wrestling coach at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas (1979-84) and an assistant at U-M (1984-86). He lives in Novi and is a successful businessman.

CARIE MAIER: Class of 1990. Maier was the first recipient of the Miss Soccer Award in 1990 and earned All-American honors as a senior. She scored more than 80 goals in four years of high school soccer and led the Falcons to the Class A semifinals in 1989. She also competed in track, setting a school record in the 200-meter dash and contributing to other records in the 800 and 400 relays.

Maier played four years of soccer at the University of Wisconsin, serving as team captain and leading the Badgers to the Big Ten title as a senior. She was a Central Region All-American. After completing her college career, Maier has coached extensively. She lives in Ann Arbor and has been an assistant coach with the U-M women's soccer team since 1997.
