Stan likes to keep busy. When he is not volunteering here at the police department, he is working part time with Gity Traffic Engineer Kevin McCarthy, or gathering data. Stan's hobbies are golf and improving his computer skills. The Farmington Hills Police Department is proud to have volunteers like Stan. 





















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
