
### Farmington Hills Squirt hockey champions

Three of Plymouth's four wins came on Erie's home ice. The Whalers finished this season unbeaten at Erie (5-0-1).
The end of the line for the Otters came when the Whalers followed a 6-2 win Saturday at Compuware Arena with a 7-4 triumph Sunday in Erie.
A dozen players scored points in the Whalers' last two games, led by Chad Wisseman, who scored three goals. Damian Surma contributed two goals and two assists, Kris Vernarsky had two goals and an assist, and Tomas Kurka collected a goal
