Rocky adds clout to rape law

Rape victims such as a Ferndale woman who tostified recently before the state House Criminal Justice Com-mittee now have more clout when it comes to convicting their assailants, with a big assist from Farmington Hills state Rep. Andrew Raczkowski. Farmington Area Jaycees are hosting a Wine & Cheese Social on Wednes-

of rape victims whose assailants may take years to find and bring to trial, by extending the statute of limitations for such crimes. The 37th House District Republican apparently played a crucial role in tacking on an amendment to new legislation that offers further protection for the victims of violent crime. That amendment totally climinates the statuto of limitations for first-degree criminal sexual assault.

"I am eestatic," said Raczkowski Wednesday, several hours after state

Lt. Gov. Dick Posthumus signed the bill into law. "That is a big piece of leg-islation. ... Michigan is now in the fore-front" of those states with such a mea-

front" of those states with such a measure.

Meanwhile, Senate Bill 1, sponsored by state Sen. Shirley Johnson, extends from six-to-10 years the statute of limitations for second-, third- and fourthedgree criminal sexual conduct, attempted murder and manslaughter and holds the statute of limitations for crimes where there are no suspects matching available DNA evidence.

Senate Bill 1 was signed into law Wednesday by Lt. Gov. Dick Posthumus.

Raczkowski's amendment added attempted murder, manslaughter and first-degree home invasion to the list. At the time Johnson's bill was being reviewed by the Criminal Justice Committee earlier this year, Raczkowski gave it the support it needed to become law. Hearing the testimony of Ferndale woman Johnene Barr apparently was enough for Raczkowski to become involved.

"Senator Johnson always wanted there to be no statute of limitations on rape cases," said Stacey Hanysak, a legislative nide for the senator. "That's
