Herrington is a member of the 2001

Herrington has a 285-54-1 record in
31 seasons as the only head football
coach in Harrison history.
His teams have won a record 11
state championships, including four
in a row since 1997. Harrison's 19
playoff and 14 state-final appearances
are records, too.

"The regional was exciting and very intense," Shenton said. 'Emotionally and physically, it took a lot to come through in those matches.


"It was a little tough to regroup and get back up to playing a high level of tennis, but we were able to survive.
