Mustangs rally to win league crown

Northville's Larissa Fill gave a performance Thursday afternoon that deserved a standing ovation. The junior striker put on a dazzling display of soccer, pumping in all four of the host Mustangs' goals in a come-from-behind, 4-3 victory over Livonia Stevenson in the Western Livonia Activities Association championship game.

Displaying ball skills that rank with the best ever to play in the WLA, Fill gave a high octane performance that carried Northville to its first league championship in school history.

Her goal from Lindsey Miglio with 20:28 left in the match tied the score at 3-3. She then wheeled around just outside the Stevenson box and drilled a left-footed shot past club teammate Katherine Koch for the game-winning goal, her 22nd of the year, with just 5:09 remaining.

"You never see seven (total) goals in a championship game, but today you saw two teams with a lot of offense," Northville coach Ron Meteyer said. "Today Larissa had a career-type game. She was just amazing. She's never had more than two goals in a game, but she's scored at least one in every game I think but two. She's been very solid and productive all year. She's got wonderful ball control and great vision on the field."

Fill struck first for Northville at 31:16 mark of the first half, but Stevenson countered with three consecutive goals — all in the first 40 minutes.

Freshman Melissa Dobbey, coached to play by her doctor just before the day before the big game after a bout with mononucleosis, scored two straight goals.

The Spartans made it 3-1 with 5:29 left in the half when Dobbey started a play. Her pass toward the goal was settled in the box by Nicole Katikos and right on the spot for the rebound was senior Lindsay Gusek, who notched her 24th of the year.

Dobbey, unable to play the previous week in a 2-1 loss to the Mustangs, did not show any effects from her illness.

"I didn't think she was going to play, but having her in there makes a big difference in their attack," Meteyer said. "Now you have to shut down two (Gusek and Dobbey) instead of one."

But the momentum shifted again before the end of the half; Lindsey Dunmard rang a free kick off the crossbar and Fill pounced on the rebound to cut the deficit to 3-2.

"We've never given up four goals in a game since I've been coaching," said Stevenson's Jim Kimble, now in his seventh season. "Fill is a very, very good player. We've talked for two weeks now about stopping Dun-

mead and Fill, and they still frustrated us in all four goals.

"I question our toughness on defense. We played soft out of the back. It's not about our tactics. It's a matter of playing with some pride."

Stevenson nearly made it 4-2 when Dobbey rang a long free kick off the crossbar just two minutes into the second half.

Fill then went into high gear, scoring the equalizer and the game-winning goal.

"We just wanted to win it so bad," said Fill, a teammate on the Livonia Mustangs with five Stevenson players. "I just tried to force my own pace, but everybody pulled their weight. It was about the team."

The loss dropped Stevenson to 12-3 overall, while Northville improved to 15-1.

"We just didn't clear the ball out of our end all second half and we had the wind," Kimble said. But Give Northville credit. They were down 3-1 and didn't quit."

Churchill defeats Farmington

Livonia Churchill avenged a 1-0 girls soccer loss to Farmington by scoring a pair of goals in the final seven minutes Wednesday to beat the visiting Falcons, 2-1.

Deanna DeRoos tallied the game-winner with 2:50 remaining from Sarah Phillips after Phillips tied it with 6:30 to go on an assist from Michelle Esparrago.

Farmington jumped out to a 1-0 lead midway through the first half on a goal by Lorianne DeDonato.

Sarah Hartwell was in goal for the Chargers, who evened their record at 8-1 overall. The loss drops Farmington to 12-4.

"The whole team played well for the first time this year," Churchill interim coach Dave Hebestreit said. "I thought we dominated, but we weren't able to score until late when we needed it."

Franklin (2-3) stormed back to beat visiting North Farmington (6-12) in a WLA crossover.

Senior forward Deby Carlin tied it 3-3 seconds later off a rebounded shot from senior forward Jessica Katsky.

Three minutes later, Jackie Napierola notched the game-winner off a finish similar to Carlin's.

Napierola completed the scoring with a chip over the North keeper's shoulder.

"The entire team played outstanding," Franklin coach Jenny Baker said. "Many of the players said they had a good feeling going into the game that night."

Baker also singled out the performance of junior midfielder Alicia Thom, who set up the first goal; defender Kara Wawelek, junior defender Kate Roberts and Katsky, the latter whom played a vital role both as a forward and defender.

"We need to relax our attitude," North coach Tim Russell said. "We're going to give it our best shot in the district tournament, but we need a severe change in attitude before it will do us any good. Hopefully, we will pick it up."

"The frustrating thing for me and the girls is, when we don't expect to win a game, we play well and, when we do expect to win a game, we don't play well."

"We're trying different ways to motivate ourselves. You don't play a 1-0 game against Churchill and then lose some of the games we've lost."

Marlins win lacrosse contest

Farmington Hills Mercy finished the regular season in girls lacrosse Thursday with a 12-9 victory over visiting Grosse Pointe North.

Stephanie Yuhaz scored four goals to lead the Marlins, who finished 5-1-1 in the league and are 6-2-1 overall.

Julie Holland added three goals, Meg Parish and Barb Maczka two each and Kaitlyn Hayes one. Mercy led 5-4 at halftime.

"We were faster, so we beat them to a lot of ground balls," Mercy coach Kim Norton said. "We were able to move the ball around better than the other team."

Yuhaz is Mercy's leading scorer with 26 goals, and Holland is second with 19.

The Marlins finished second in Division B of the Michigan Women's Scholastic Lacrosse Association and will play either Brighton or Ann Arbor in a quarterfinal playoff game Wednesday.

The semifinals will be played at 4 and 6 p.m. Friday and the final 10 a.m. Saturday on the lower fields at Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook both days.

- 50 ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS AND INDIVIDUALS: On or about June 12, 2001 the above named City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, will request the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to release Federal funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) for the following projects:
1. Housing Rehabilitation Program to improve existing single-family housing in Farmington Hills (city-wide), Oakland County, Michigan (\$200,000.00)
 2. Alleyway Storm Drain (Section 11) which includes the installation of 4,200 linear feet of 12" to 24" storm drain pipe, and ditching in the existing right-of-way, along with street paving (\$100,000.00). Census Tracts 1656, Block 3 and 4
 3. Stockton Drain (Section 26) which includes the installation of 900 linear feet of drain pipe in the Stockton right-of-way (\$65,000.00). Census Tract 1075, Block 5
 4. Inkster Road Sidewalk Year II (Section 36) includes the installation of 2,500 linear feet of 6' wide sidewalk from Eight Mile Road to Shawneee (FY2001 - \$50,000 or \$180,000 total). Census Tract 1074, Block 2
 5. Eight Mile Right-of-Way Improvement Year II (Section 35 and 36) proposes safety improvements in the existing right-of-way west of Inkster (\$30,000.00 FY2001 or \$110,000 total). Census Tract 1073, Blocks 6 and 6, 1074 Block 2

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly, the above-named Farmington Hills, Oakland County has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (P-91-190).

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

The proposed projects will require only minor alterations to the landscape and will not destroy or interrupt natural features of the surrounding environment, such as but not limited to, water courses and wildlife.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the above-named Farmington Hills, Oakland County which documents the environmental review of the proposed projects and the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request at the Community Development Office between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County to the City Manager at 31555 W. Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, MI 48336 on or before June 1, 2001. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

The City of Farmington Hills will undertake the project described above with Block Grant Funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Farmington Hills is certifying to HUD that Farmington Hills and Steve Brock, in his official capacity as City Manager, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making and actions, and the above responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, Farmington Hills may use the Block Grant Funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is one of the following bases:

- (a) the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or
- (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24CFR, Part 58) and may be addressed to HUD, IV, McNamara Federal Building, 477 Michigan Avenue, Detroit, Michigan 48226.

Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after June 27, 2001 will be considered by HUD.
