In the first case, Domers coaxed the suspect, a 50-year-old woman, to make a full confession. A warrant was obtained for two counts of criminal sexual conduct in the first degree. In the second case, Demors got
the suspect to admit she was
very angry with the man she
lived with. Both drank heavily
and fought often. On several
occasions the man she lived with
soiled his bedding. He did this
the night of the fire, which
