Hills Memorial Park dedication slated July 16

A beautiful space for Farmington Hills residents to honor their loved ones is expected to be dedicated just before the opening of Founder's Festival.

The long-awaited Memorial Park is slated to open this sum-

mer.
"We're gearing our opening towards Founders Festival," said Tom Biasell, director of Public

Works.

The Farmington City Council gave the go-ahead for the July 16 dedication at last Monday's council meeting.

The 3.2 acre park is located at the intersection of 11 Mile and Middlebelt Roads, and is intended to give residents a quiet and contemplative environment to honor their loved ones.

The land for the park was provided to the city by Hospice of Michigan.

Biasell said the city will be marketing four different items as memorials, including memorial bricks for the walkways, 60 trees, six bird houses and six benches to be placed on the granite surfaces in the park.

The proposed cost for the memorials are \$100 per brick, \$1,000 per tree; \$3,000 for a

birdhouse and \$5,000 for a bench.

A special acknowledgment would be placed on the memorial items, he said.
