

CCW petition drive clears two hurdles

Just one obstacle remains between a spot on the ballot and the People Who Care About Kids Committee petition drive to call a referendum on Michigan's new

a referendum on Michigan's new law on carrying conceal weepons, an appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court.

Two hurdles have been overcome in the last week.

On Monday, the State Board of Canvassers voted to certify petition signatures to put the question on the 2002 ballot.

According to Mike Hodge, Lansing attorney for the com-

mittee, two Republican members of the board had been reluctant to certify, despite the fact circulators gathered more than 230,000 signatures, well over the 160,000 needed, because the CCW law includes an appropriation.

Under the constitution, spend-Under the constitution, spending bills aren't subject to referendum. But the Court of Appeals ruled last week that the referendum could go to the ballot, spending aside. Filing suit to block the election have been the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and the Michigan Coalition of Responsible Gun Owners.

The groups have already filed

an appeal of the Court of Appeals decision to the Supreme Court, as had been expected.
Hodge said briefs on the case have yet to be filed with the top court. The justices are expected to rule by July 1.
State lawmakers adopted the "shall issue" CCW law last year, taking discretion out of the hands of local gun boards and requiring that permits to carry be issued as long as applicants meet the criteria.
Applicants must have clean-records and be free of mental illness to get a permit. They must be at least age 21 and undergo training.
