"Detroit is just a market of huge music fans,"
said Dave Clark, who works in event production
and marketing for SFX in Northville. No one

For Clark summer doesn't start until Dave Matthews Band returns to Detroit's Comerica Park: 'He played the first show ever at Comerica Park and it was awesome.' But Clark anticipates the second band to grace the stage at the new ball park, N'Syne, will carn it is spot in pop music history. N'Syne is bringing along a 6-story high stage and a production like no one has seen to keep its legions of fans entertained. Both pop divas are scheduled to play the Plance of Auburn Hills. Both have added second shows due to demand. And both will cost a pretty penny.
