based on well-known celebrity Oprah Winfrey's definition.

"On life's report card attitude counts, enthusiasm counts, a commitment to lifelong learning counts, hard work counts and helping others counts," Barrett said. "If you go all out on these things, you will feel the difference in the quality of your life and that is what success is all about."

All three high schools will hold graduation ceremonies at the Compuware Arena in Plymouth Township on Sunday, June 3. The schedule is 1 p.m. North Farmington, 4:30 p.m. Farmington and 8 p.m. Harrison.

Farmington Public School Superintendent Bob Maxfield, each high school principal, two school board members, and class presidents will speak at each ceremony.

Board members Priscilla Brouillette and Cathy Webb will speak at the Farmington High commencement, with class president Matt Gasparotto. Linda Eshery and Jack Inch at Harrison High will be joined by co-class presidents Amber Bahr and Brian Fink. At North Farmington, Bobbie Feldman and Gary Sharp will speak on behalf of the board and Dan Goshorn will represent his class.

Graduates number 248 at Farmington High, 229 at Harrison High School and 245 at North Farmington High School.

Top of the class

Farmington High School student Stephen Wayne stands alone because he hasn't been absent from school since kindergarten.

"This means he's attended school for over 2,300 consecutive school days," Barrett said. "That is very unique in this day and age."

Eight Farmington High School students attained a 4.0 grade point average each year for all four years of high school.

"Last year, there were only four students who held this distinction," Barrett said. "This is an outstanding achievement and as a part of a new tradition started last year we're honoring them with this gold medal representing academic excellence."

They are: Arooj El-Jawahri, Lindsey Mergener, Sarah Nalett, Amanda Patton, Suchita Shah, Hemanth Srinivas, Ellen Waisanen and Angela Zerbosia.

Students achieving this same honor at Harrison High School are Brian Fink, Jill Maxey, Elizabeth Bares, Karolyn Knutson, Melissa Love, and Kimberly Washington.

At North Farmington High School, four students achieved a 4.0 GPA for four years: Rachel Belkin, Joyce Chung, Brian Doughty and Nicole Little.

North Farmington High Principal Rick Jones said this year's graduating class ranks among the top three in his memory. "They are well-rounded and very service-oriented," Jones said. "There's a dignity and gentleness in this class."

Compliments also flowed at Harrison High.

"This year's graduates have been offered more than \$1,250,000 in scholarship money," said Margaret Van Amedye, a Harrison High school counselor. "Seventy students are Michigan Merit Award recipients and 33 are Phi Beta Kappa," she said.

This year marks the first year a \$500 scholarship was presented in memory of Daniel Lee, a 16-year-old student who died in a traffic accident, in front of Harrison High School in the spring of 2000, Van Amedye said. Lee was killed when the car his older brother was driving was broadsided on 12 Mile Road near the school.

Students rallied for a traffic signal on 12 Mile Road which was installed at the west entrance after the fatal accident, she said. Students, staffers and bus drivers making left-hand turns out of the high school parking lot must use that exit and signal.
