"I think that was at the back of my mind, but I pushed that thought out," The borowice asid. "I thought 'OK, there's my wakeup call; let's go out and play, 'ended up birdioing the second hole.

"On Saturday, I didn't really stick any shots. Seventy-four was kind of a boring round.
"It was solid golf, but it could have been lower. I think I only had three birde putts. But I birdied the 18th, so that was a really nice way to finish it out."
