A Farmington Hills kennel operator is in the dog house with his neighbors following a complaint about barking dogs that got him a ticket for violating the city's noise ordinance.

But some neighbors say they wish the city had a bad smell ordinance, too — because of the foul edors they say they have caused them to live like hermits in their own homes.

We're tired of the smell and we're tired of the barking,' said Kelly Sue Davis, who lives on

Randall, behind the kennel. She described the prevailing odor as a "lovely ammonia smell."
She described a Memorial Day cookout that wound up being held indoors because of foul odors. Davis said dog urine is simply rinsed away, which causes her concerns about its impact on the environment.
Hills City Attorney John Donothne said the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality has inspected the kennel.
We have not been able to verify any kind of violations in that regard, he said.

City officials are also baring their teeth over the kennel. City Manager Steve Brock called

Oakland County's decision to reissue the kennel's license
"unconscionable."
"We're going to redouble our
efforts to close them down,"
Brock said. "The only time they
didn't have any dogs is when
they were closed down."

Waldeslust Kennels has been
open since 1951, before any of
the neighboring homes were
built around it. Because it was
there first, it is considered
"grandfathered" although it does
not comply with current zoning.
Its owner is Erna McCoy, whose
son, Tom McCoy, operates the
kennel.

He said he has taken several steps toward making the business a better neighbor. In October 2000 he was ordered by the 47th District Court to clear out the dogs until he completed several improvements. He reopened March 17 after getting an OK from Oakland County Animal Control.

Sgt. Jerry McNair of Oakland County Animal Control confirmed that Waldeelust Kennels was given permission to reopen after making some improvements.
