Mall banks on new theater operator

Livonia Mall management is banking on a new operator to project a better image of its

banking on a new operator to project a better image of its movie theaters. David Tolfree, who operates the Shores Theater in St. Clair Shores, will run the Livonia Mall Cinemas, which have been shuttered since December after a pipe burst and caused extensive damage. The theater on Seven Mile and Middlebelt is expected to open sometime during the next two weeks, a mall official said. As of Friday, no formal date for the opening had been announced. "We're really excited about having (Tolfree) come into play," said Bobbie Gelman, Livonia Mall spokeswoman. "He's a real sport plug." In December, a pipe ruptured during a spell of frigid weather and flooded one auditorium with 4 feet of water, which resulted in the concrete floor sinking 6 inches.

The repairs follow a major

renovation project that closed the three-screen operation for

renovation project that closed the three-screen operation for two years.

Livonia Mall Cinemas reopened in April 2000 with a new Dobly Surround Sound system, remodeled snack bar and seats with cupholders. Harold Turel operated the 36-year-old cinema until the pipe break forced the shutdown.

Merchants are looking for the theater to provide a needed shot in the arm during the lull before back-to-school sales start. The cinema will continue to show second-run films.

"Actually, it's going to help a lot," said Cyntara Payne, manager of Orange Julius-Dniry Queen that is a few doors down from the cinema. "When they were open, aspecially on week-

were open, especially on week-ends, (business) was really good."

Koney Island Inn also sees spillover traffic from theater-goers. Otherwise, the eatery depends on shoppers and mall employees.
