(1) Charcoal cookers, braziers, hibachis, grills, outdoor fireplaces or gas-fired stoves and similar semi-enclosed devices on the premises of a one-family detached dwelling.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 7, Building and Building Regulations, Article II, is hereby amended to read as follows:

STATE CONSTRUCTION CODES

7.28. Assumption of responsibility for administration and enforcement. In accordance with the applicable provisions of Act No. 220 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1972 (MCL 125.1601, et. seq., MSA 9.2949(1) et. seq.), as amended, the City hereby assumes the responsibility for the administration and enforcement of the State of Michigan Construction Codes throughout its corporate limits.

The Building Official and designated inspectors are hereby designated as the enforcing agency to discharge the responsibilities of the City under the Act and this Code.

7.27. Fee schedule.

The City Council shall adopt by resolution a fee schedule. Such fees shall bear reasonable relationship to all costs, including overhead of services rendered, and may be changed from time to time.

7.28. References and amendments.

The following references in the State of Michigan Construction Codes shall be interpreted as follows: "state" and "name of state" shall mean the State of Michigan; "municipalities" and "name of municipality" shall mean the City of Farmington Hills; "municipal charter" shall mean the Charter of the City of Farmington Hills; and "local ordinances" shall mean the ordinances contained in the Code Ordinances of the City of Farmington Hills.
