Anyone wishing to run for public office in Farmington or Farmington Hills will face filing deadlines next month. Three Farmington City Council terms, held by Mary Bush, Arnold Campbell and James Mitchell, will

expire this year. According to Farmington City Clerk Patsy Cantrell, Bush and Campbell have four-year seats;

Mitchell has a two-year seat. Bush has been on the council since first being elected in 1993. Compbell served from 1995.89 and then again in 1991, from which time he served continuously. Mitchell has served since 1995. The Farmington Council race Nov. 6 is non-partian, and there is no primary. Council elections are held ever two years, and three council members are elected each time. time.
