Nine West Bloomfield residents who paid for anow removal services they did not receive last winter should get their money back.

In a plea agreement authorized Tuesday in 48th District Court in Bloomfield Township, John Church, a Livonia resident who owns The Snow Guys Inc., pleaded no contest to one count of misdemeanor larceny.

Church was acheduled to stand trial that same day on since larceny charges, but he reached a deal with the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office prior to the start of the proceedings.

Sgt. Tim Diamond of the West Bloomfield Police Department's Detective's Bureau said Church promised to pay some \$1,000 in restitution to nine West Bloomfield residents who paid Church money last fall, but did not see a snow plow at their home at all last winter.

Church is scheduled to return to Judge Diane D'Agostini's courtroom Sept. 10 for sentencing, Maximum penalties include 90 days in jail, a \$500 fine and probation.

Some two dozen police complaints were filed last winter by West Bloomfield residents who contracted Church's services when several heavy snowfalls came. Similar complaints were filed with the Farmington Hills Police Department.

According to contracts signed by the customers, Church collected \$99 from residents for 10 snow plowings during the winter. There was a \$10 charge per push after 10 initial pushes.

Church told Diamond he had no criminal intent but said he could not plow for all his customers because the was overwhelmed with the December snowfall and had several equipment breakdowns.

Several of the customers have filed lnwsuits against Church.
