# Hills teens face robbery charges

An articulate, well-liked Har-rison High School varsity full-back and a friend who graduat-ed from Harrison in June face armed robbery charges after a gas station holdup early Wednesday. gas station holdup early Wednesday.

Jason Reed, 17, a senior, had distinguished himself as a pan-elist on the school multicultural-ism committee. "Jason is a very

nice intelligent young man, someone I think a lot of kids

someone I think a lot of kids know, a very good young man, aid principal Rande Horn.
"I was shocked," Horn said, after learning of the armed robbery charge on Friday.
The gas station clerk who handed over about \$90 in cash said both thieves wore black masks. One was described as wearing a blue jersey with white numbers or letters. Police said two youths used a BB gun to commit the crime.
Not guilty pleas were entered on behalf of Reed and Ledurius Anthony Brown, 18, also of Farmington Hills, at an arraignment Aug. I before 47th District Judge Frederick Harris. Both rare scheduled to return to court

are scheduled to return to court Aug. 13 to appear at a prelimi-nary hearing on the charges. Both are charged with one count of armed robbery. Reed is also charged with driving with-out a license on his person.

both of Ledarius was new to us last year, 'Horn said. 'I knew Jason much botter than Ledarius.' According to the incident report, Farmington Hills Police received a call at 2:18 a.m. that an armed robbery had just occurred at a Mobil station at 25509 Crehard Lake Road.

The female clerk said there were two robbers. She described them as black, in their 20s and both 6 feet.

She said the suspect wearing the jersey also wore blue jeans and carried a rifle with a wood stock. She said a second suspect wore a black or blue long-sleeved jersey or jacket with no writing.

The clerk told police the thief with the numbered jersey point of the rifle at her as she was behind a register and a clear harrier. He ordered her to unlock the door, she did, and the second thief entered. He then removed \$50 from a register.

The mon told her to open a second register, the incident report continued. When the clerk told them she couldn't open it, she gave them \$40 she was going to place in a safe.

One thief grabbed the woman's handbag, then dropped it when she told him it contained an money the report continued.

woman's nanones, then cropped it when she told him it contained no money, the report continued. The two thieves left the scene in a 1999 Lincoln, but were soon stopped without incident by police at 11 Mile and Orchard Lake Raads and arrested. Following their arraignment Wednesday, both were freed on \$25,000 personal bond each, which means they can continue to live at home while facing the charges.

Both were ordered to wear electronic tethers, to follow a 9 p.m. curfew and not to contact each other.

The minimum penalty for armed robbery is two years in jail.

Horn said school officials have yet to determine if Reed can return to school to begin his senior year Aug. 27.

"Certainly we want to review our code of conduct. The last thing we want to do is to add to the tragedy of what's already happened to this young man already." Horn said.
