#### Knollenberg, local clergy respond to President's stem cell decision

President George Bush's stand on use of cells from human embryos for research drew a mixed reaction from Farmington area clergy and politi-

cians. Bush will allow using federal money to research existing stem-cell lines, a decision he said balances concerns about "protecting life and improving life." Around the nation, these favoring the research criticize Bush for not allowing scientists to develop new lines
