This was one of many soccer camps conducted by the Detroit Rockers, the local member of the National Professional Soccer League, which played most of its home games at Plymouth's Compuware Arena last season. The

three guys were Rockers — or at least they were when the summer started.

The camps will continue another couple of weeks; the Rockers won't go beyond that.

On Wednesday, it was made official: The NPSL is gone, or rather it will be renamed. Of the 10 teams that were in the league last season, six will play this year under the title Major Indoor Soccer League: current champion Milwaukee, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Harrisbürg (Pa.) and Kansas City.

Buffalo, Wichita, Toronto and Detroit are out.

Financial concerns are the major problem. The MISL will adopt a structure similar to Major League Soccer's, with all player contracts owned by the league.
