"The new Stephen series resources are wonderful," said Melinda McKay, "We have better trained Stephen Ministers and a more effective ministry. We have poised now to meet the caregiving challenges of the new century."

Stephen Ministry began in 1976 when Dr. Kenneth Haugk, a paster and clinical psychologist in St. Louis, Mo. trained parishioners to help meet the needs for care in his congregation. The ministry was so successful that other congregations became interested, and Haugk founded the Stephen Ministries organization. Since then, more than 7,000 congregations have became interested, and Haugk founded the Stephen Ministries organization and come from all 50 states, nine Canadian provinces and 20 other countries.

The Stephen Ministries organization annually hosts six Leader's Training Courses across the U.S. At these courses, over 37,000 pastors and church leaders have been trained as Stephen Ministers. An estimated three-quarters of a million people have received the formal care of a Stephen Minister, and millions more have been tuched in an informal way.
