## Firefighters, city sign off on five-year agreement

A new five-year contract between Farmington Hills fire-fighters and the city has been settled.

Approved overwhelmingly by
the firefighters union and ratified by city council Aug. 20, the
new contract calls for a 3-percent pay raise each year,
increases in pension contributions and benefits, and a dental
insurance benefit increase.

Farmington Hills has 33
career or full-time firefighters
and around 60 part-time, nonunion firefighters. Career firefighters who reach the top of the
pay scale after four years of service earn \$55,000 per year.

"I'm very pleased and glad
that we were able to wrap up
negotiations in record time,
said City Mannager Steve Brock.
