## School district, community react with stepped up security Tuesday

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Farmington Public Schools
reacted quickly to the national
tragedy which unfolded with
Tuesday's new school day.
While middle and high school
students learned about the
tragedy at the World Trade Canter in New York City and at the
Pentagon in Washington, D.C.,
school officials asked building
administrators not to mention it

to preschool/elementary school children unless a student asked about it.
"It's important to emphasize that children are safe and that if they need more information, their parents will be able to explain it to them tonight."
That was the message contained in a memo delivered about 9:30 a.m. by Estralee Michaelson, director of Safe/Drug Free Schools, which came from Farmington School threats against any school or governmental building in the state of Michigan," the memorad. "We are defining this situ-ation as a precautionary mea-sure."

Personnel were directed to keep students within the building and ideally within the classroom. They were instructed on to lunch and bathrooms within the building. Parents were permitted to pick up their children if they chose, and dismissels remained on schedule. Students were to be supervised closely as they moved through the building.

About 10:30 a.m. the school district announced it was canceling school board meetings, other evening meetings and after-school activities because of "world events."
School Superintondent Bob Maxifeld grappled with the question of whether school should be closed Wednesday, Some people raised issues of whether there would be a safety threat.
"Wo have strong safety plans," he said. "They were also concerned about irresponsible finger pointing at certain ethnic

pointing at certain ethnic groups. This is such a horrible

thing for us to deal with."

His decision: "School is the best place to be. School is a safe place, emotionally and physical-

Maxfield visited different schools throughout the day. He found a range of feelings from contusion to disbelled. By the end of the day his opinions matched that of a Farmington High School team when the school team was poke.

"It's hard, whose two know what to think," Maxfield said.

One student couldn't understand why the evening basketball game was canceled, he said.
"A couple of kids wanted to talk to somebody," Barrett said. "Some kids came down because they have relatives in D. C. or New York."

Local security
In the central part of town, Farmington Public Safety Director Gary Goss kept abreast of news reports. Goss didn't need to put anyone on standby because off-duty officers are always on standby, he said.

In a paid, call-back department, members are cross-trained to serve as police officers, firefighters and mergency responders. They carry "minitiors," which are small radio receivers that emit a distinguishable tone to alert the public safety officers, be said.

"Nothing has happened (here)." Goss said. We have no installations in the city, no federal building. We don't even have a post office anymore. We don't have major targets in Farmington. Farmington Place is our biggeat building. This is a horrific situation, no question about it. We will be keeping an eye on certain buildings. Goss, do, drow comparisons with Pearl Harbor. However, he is of the Victnam era and served in the Marines.
"It is similar to Pearl Harbor but then you knew who the enemy was," Goss said. "Time is on our side. We don't have treat immediately. If like to see the country come together and strengthen our resolve. We need to pull together as a nation. Time will heal. I have. a firm belief the perpetrators will be brought to justice."









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
