### GLIAC honors Wayne

Stephen Wayne of Farmington was named the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference's Special Teams Player of the Week after he kicked the winning field goal Saturday for Wayne State University.

Wayne's 33-yard field goal with three seconds remaining gave the Warriors a 19-16 victory over host Ashland University at Community Stadium in Ashland, Ohio.

Ashland called a timeout with four seconds left in an unsuccessful attempt to ice Wayne, who also booted a 27-yard field goal in the second quarter.

"It was real exciting," said Wayne, who was mobbed by his teammates afterward. "I've been in that situation, and I've made it and missed it; so I know how it feels to do both. It feels much better to make it."

"When they called the timeout, I went to talk to my coach, and he said to just follow through. He said it was just a game-winner; it was no big deal."

"Last year I guess (the Warriors) lost on a last-second field goal to Ashland. So it was kinda the same situation - *deja vu* for everybody."

Wayne also made a touchdown-saving tackle on a kickoff Saturday.

"That made it all the more exciting," he said.

Wayne also kicks extra points for the Warriors (1-1), who lost their first game to Northern Iowa.

### Afflerbaugh wins race

Carol Afflerbaugh of Farmington Hills placed first in her age bracket at the Mackinac Island 8 Mile Road Race on Saturday.

# Terrorist acts put athletics on hold

■ A national emergency resulting from terrorist attacks against the World Trade Center in New York and the Pentagon in the nation's capital forced cancellation of all area sporting events Tuesday. Observer schools resumed a regular schedule of competition Wednesday.

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As with every other aspect of American life on Tuesday, the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington forced changes in athletic competition.

Nearly every local high school and college cancelled athletic competition and practice on Tuesday as events unfolded in the worst act of terrorism in U.S. history.

By Wednesday, things were back to normal for almost every area team. The Plymouth Whalers did postpone Thursday's game at Windsor. And Red-

ford St. Agatha cancelled practice for football and girls basketball, but that was due to delays in most of their athletes returning from a field trip to Canada.

The Farmington-North Farmington varsity and JV boys soccer games postponed from Tuesday will be played at 7 and 6:30 tonight, respectively.

The games, however, have been moved from North to Farmington High since the stadium facility at North was already scheduled for use.

On Tuesday, however, holding practices and games were the exception rather than the rule. Schoolcraft Col-

lege played its volleyball match at Macomb Community College on Tuesday night.

Redford Thurston cancelled its games - a girls basketball game against Taylor Kennedy and a swim meet with Livonia Franklin - but left practices to the discretion of coaches.

"We left it up to them," said Thurston athletic director Al Chambo. "The students who chose not to go could do so without a problem. The coaches were sensitive to this."

Only a handful of coaches chose to practice, including the girls tennis team - which spent more time sorting through the events of what was happening than hitting the ball.

"I wanted to be able to talk to the kids about what happened," said tennis coach Rich Bacolor, whose team spent 30 of its 45-minute practice discussing the day's events. "When something like

this happens, it's good to talk about it - talk about what was going on and what their reactions were. It was good for them to process the whole thing and they had some good questions."

For the Eagles, it was also a chance to get closer to themselves and the people around them.

"I wanted to be sure to remind the kids that there's more important things than tennis and how important their relationship with people are at times like this," said Bacolor. "We got through this last year (with the death of freshman cross-country runner Diana Baskin) and the kids need to know that there are more important things."

The sentiment was shared across the area as schools - public and private, from Farmington to Wayne, from Plymouth to Redford - cancelled events.

## Senior star sets pace for North girls

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Not only is senior Lindsy McErlean back for one more season, the North Farmington swimmer is healthy this year.

A broken arm caused her to miss most of last season, but McErlean still managed to qualify for the state meet and score in two events.

McErlean's specialties are the backstroke and individual medley, but she had to swim the 100 freestyle and butterfly in the Class A Finals due to the injury.

As a sophomore, she took fifth place in the backstroke and IM at the state meet, and North coach Pat Duthie hopes McErlean ends her prep career with a big finish in November.

"She's looking pretty strong; fortunately, the injury from last year didn't carry over," Duthie said. "She made a great comeback last year and had lots of bests in both events she was able to swim in."

"They were off events; she couldn't swim the backstroke with her arm, and that took her out of the IM. She wasn't in top shape, but she had a real nice personal accomplishment."

"She demonstrated a lot of character to come back and do what she did. She's a real hard worker; she has nice talent and uses it well."

McErlean already is swimming under 2:11 in the IM and has her time down to 1:00.1 in the backstroke. The expectation is she'll swim those events again at the state meet.

"What place she gets is dependent on what the competition is," Duthie said. "I think she's looking to see what she can accomplish time-wise and see where those times take her."

"If she has a good year training and working hard, I believe she'll be just fine when it comes to the state meet, and things will fall into place pretty

well for her."

With a talent like McErlean heading a strong senior class, the Raiders hope to have another good year in girls swimming and diving.

North was third in the Western Lakes Activities Association and returns 13 swimmers who scored points in last year's league meet.

The Raiders also finished third Saturday in the annual WLAA Relays

Jeff Shumer sent a pass to Holland up the middle; Holland beat two defenders and put a low shot past the Glenwood keeper for a 2-0 score.

The opposition then dropped a shot by Holland, but the ball caromed to North's Gary Polesky, who fired the rebound into the net from 12 yards for his sixth goal of the season.
