"How can you have public hearings when the decision is moot?" she said. She also criticized council for absolving the land sellers of responsibility for cleaning up the former landfill site.

"We considered it in the price of the property," City Manager Steve Brock responded.

Backed by voters who supported a recreation millage, the city administration bought the land for \$4.5 million.

"Are you going to misapply the money of taxpayers for a golf course?" Johnston asked.

"There is millage money, \$1.5 million voted for this project," Brock said.

Ken Mansey, a council candidate, told council, "A lot of the comments we're hearing here in it's a little early to enter into this. It isn't just the golf course; people don't want more development in terms of housing."

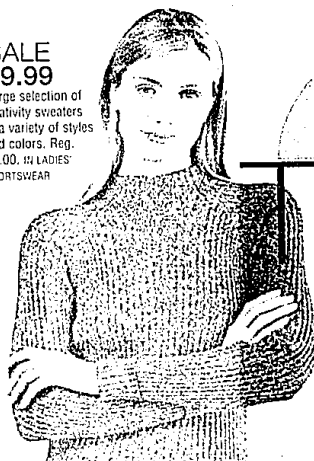
"We have a city-owned piece of property. We don't want condos on that precious green space."

But several council members said the planned 72 condo units on the parcel are important, as they'll help pay for the golf course and other planned improvements.

The city administration said the site plan should be presented to the planning commission by the end of the year.

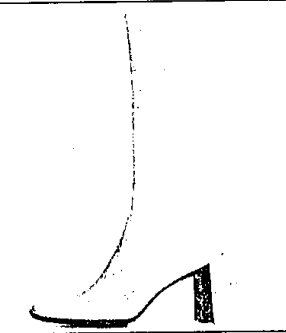

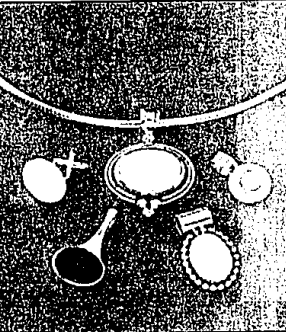
