

C'ville's Shaw sets TD record

Tim Shaw put his name in the Michigan High School Athletic Association record book Friday. The 6-foot-2, 222-pound tailback scored five touchdowns in Livonia Clarenceville's 58-8 football victory at Hamtramck.

Shaw surpassed the career mark of 98 TDs set by Benny Clark of Ravenna from 1993-96. His first TD came on a 17-yarder in the first quarter followed by Pete Shaw's 19-yard scoring toss to Steve Meadows to give the Trojans a 14-0 lead.

In the second quarter, Meadows scored on a 28-yard run fol-

lowed by four more Shaw TDs on runs of 34, 23 and 29 yards and an 86-yard interception return as the Trojans (4-0) took a 45-0 halftime lead.

The interception return tied the career mark of Whittier-Fresno's Tom Tyson, who ranked second on the list with 97 TDs from 1992-95.

In the third period, Meadows scored on a 54-yard run before winless Hamtramck made a TD and two-point conversion

Matt Saylor scored on a 13-yard run in the final period for Clarenceville.

Meadows finished with 146 yards in six carries. Shaw added 120 on six carries and Jeff Fioretti 32 on four.

Pete Shaw completed three of six passes for 89 yards, including a 36-yarder to Bill Nesbitt.

Defensively, Meadows had seven tackles and one sack; Andrew Shaw had six tackles and one interception and Adam Carpenter also picked off a pass.

CENTRAL 43, N. FARMINGTON 28: Senior receiver Brian Johns caught four touchdowns Friday for the visiting Raiders, who had the lead in the third quarter, 23-21.

Walled Lake Central (3-3) countered with three straight touchdowns to regain the lead and provide its margin of victory over upstart North Farmington.

Ryan Triller's 30-yard TD pass to Joe Murray and the first of four TD passes by Mike Schmitt, the first of 30 yards, gave the Vikings a 14-0 lead in the first quarter.

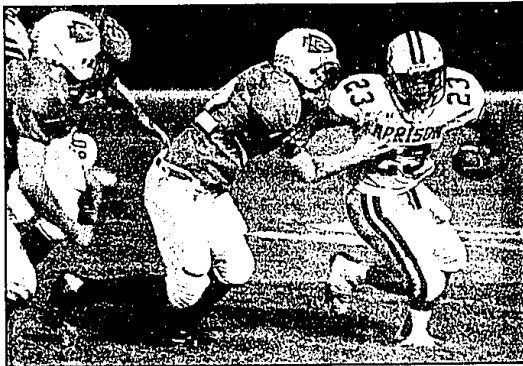
But the Raiders (1-3) rallied to tie the score at the end of the period on a pair of Bryan Smith TD passes to Johns covering 15 and 11 yards. Jon McEl kicked both PATs.

Central led at halftime, 23-17, following a 35-yard TD run by Schultz and Mott's 23-yard field goal for North.

Johns caught 12 yards to Johns in the third quarter, and the Raiders led 23-21 following a bad snap on the extra point attempt.

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been more proud of a football team. I was so proud of the way they hung in there and didn't give in to Harrison. They just have too much speed.

Harrison secured its biggest lead of the night, 42-14, 24 seconds into the second half when Stanton galloped 63 yards on a broken play. From that point, the Chiefs outscored the state's top-ranked team, 21-3, but it was too little, too late.

"Their defense was swarming," Stanton said. "If I was going to set up a defense to play against us, I would play the same one Canton did."

The Hawk offense racked up 437 total yards. Stanton threw for 156 yards and a touchdown, and he also ran six times for 99 yards and a score.

Harrison junior back Marcus Woods and Shabab proved to be just as elusive as Stanton, combining for 315 yards and four TDs. Among Woods' game-high 155 yards rushing was a 71-yard scoring dash in the first half.

"There were a few times in the first half when we had our defensive guys right where we wanted them, but we'd miss a tackle and then — boom! — they're off to the races," Baechler said.

Canton's brightest offensive star was senior tight end Chris Smilo, who hauled in six Bren-

dan Murphy arials for 114 yards and two touchdowns. On at least three occasions, Smilo simply outjumped the smaller Hawk defensive backs for the ball.

Murphy completed nine of 20 passes for 175 yards. Overall, the Chiefs finished with 335 total yards.

"I was very happy with our offensive line play, too," Baechler said. "They were in my doghouse coming into the game, but I thought they did a great job against a very good defense."

The Chiefs' opening drive was typical of the kind of offense they had displayed in their opening three games: 10 plays, 80 yards, five minutes, seven points. It climaxed when Murphy hit Smilo with a 7-yard slant pass in front of a slipping Hawk cornerback.

Canton got the ball back a minute later when Stanton's second pass of the night bounced off the shoulder pads of wide receiver Terrill Mayberry and into the hands of Chief defensive back Bill Gazai at the Canton 38.

Keyed by a 22-yard completion to Brandon Wilcox and a 23-yard hook-up with Smilo, Canton moved the ball down the field on a fourth-and-3 play from the 7. Shabab intercepted Murphy's pass in the end zone.

Canton stymied Harrison's explosive offense once again — at least until Stanton connected with Shabab on the 63-yard, fair-weather pass to tie 7-7.

Harrison grabbed the lead for good, 14-7, when Shabab got the ball on a reverse, faked out three Canton defenders before cutting back against the grain to complete a 63-yard touchdown run.

The lead expanded to 21-7 when, on the Chiefs' next offensive play, Hawk nose tackle Chris Kuclo picked off an errant Murphy pass and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown.

Harrison's offensive parade continued when Woods scampered 24 yards with 6:30 to go in the first half to make it 28-7. On the play prior to Woods' TD, Stanton had bolted 26 yards down the sideline on a keeper.

A 4-yard run by Gazai cut Canton's deficit to 28-14 with 1:40 to go in the half, but Harrison countered with Woods' 71-yard run to increase the lead to 35-14.

After Harrison scored on its opening drive of the second half, Kobus finished off a 13-play, 67-yard drive with a 7-yard TD run to bring the Chiefs to within 42-21.

The Hawks' final points came with 8:50 left on a 23-yard field goal by Mike Kloosterman, who was also 6-for-6 on extra points.

Notice of Adoption of Ordinance C-9-01, an Ordinance to amend the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article XXII, General Provisions, Section 34-639 (a)(3), relating to accessory structures, in order to clarify the limitations on accessory structures within easements.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 34, Zoning, Article XXII, Section 34-639 (a)(3), Accessory buildings and structures is hereby amended to read as follows:

(3) A detached accessory building shall not be located within ten (10) feet of any main building, nor shall it be located within (1) foot of an alley right-of-way. In no instance shall an accessory building or deck be located within an easement for public utilities or a public or private right-of-way."

Section 4. Savings.
Section 5. Effective Date.
Section 6. Enactment.

Hawks swim past Falcons

Led by Jakki Waldecker and Katie Steff, Farmington Harrison won all but three events and defeated Farmington in girls swimming and diving Thursday, 110-75.

Waldecker won the 200-yard individual medley (2:26.78) and the breaststroke (1:13.79), and Steff had first-place swims in the butterfly (1:06.35) and the 500 freestyle (5:38.23).

They also teamed with Katie Riley and Danielle Liebowitz to win the medley relay (2:04.92). Steff joined Laura Uridge, Ellen Doughty and Beth Leeb in giving the Hawks a victory in the 400 freestyle relay (4:11.18).

Doughty won the 50 freestyle (27.88) and Riley the backstroke (1:10.7).

Farmington's Katie Fleck was a double winner in the 200 freestyle (2:09.73) and the 100 freestyle (59.62). Teammate Jillian Helack won the diving with 88.30 points, and the Falcons won the 200 freestyle relay (1:52.50).

The Hawks swept the IM with Alex Evans finishing second (2:34.58) and Liz Steiber third (2:42.33). They did the same in the backstroke as Steiber (1:12.74) and Kim Nordhoff (1:13.80) followed Riley to the finish line.

Uridge had a pair of second places in the 200 freestyle (2:09.73) and the 500 freestyle (5:48.20), and Evans was the runner-up in the breaststroke (1:19.32). Uridge's time in the 200 was an all-time best.

Harrison's Steiber, Evans, Doughty and Nordhoff were second in the medley relay (2:09.46), and the team of Waldecker, Liebowitz, Uridge and Leeb did likewise in the 200 freestyle relay (1:55.65).

"I'm real pleased with how the team performed," Harrison coach Ross Bandy said. "We talked about how the third, fourth and fifth places really counted."

"We have a nice group of upper classmen, and I'm proud of them because they did exactly what I wanted them to do."

"The kids swam well and we're very pleased to come out with a win."
