

Mercy prevails in double OT

Farmington Hills Mercy needed two overtimes Thursday to turn back visiting Riverview Gabriel Richard and win a Catholic League girls basketball game, 51-48.

The score was tied at nine after one quarter. Richard led at halftime, 20-17, but Mercy pulled even with an 8-5 edge in the third period.

Both teams added another 13 points in the fourth, and the Marlins outscored the Raiders in the two overtimes, 13-10.

Alexandria Marshall scored 12 points and Whitney Johnson 10 to lead Mercy, which improved to 3-1 overall. Deirdre Jones added nine and Barb Muehlschlag eight.

"This was not a good game for us," Mercy coach Kristin Wright-Guinn said. "We hadn't practiced the last two days and it showed. We weren't in sync; we were out of sync."

"But the girls showed a lot of fight and were able to come back and win the game. Every ounce of energy was spent."

Gabriel Richard's Carla Callaway scored 13 points and Dianne Foley 11. The Raiders made seven of 16 free throws, the Marlins nine of 14.

LAKELAND 33, N. FARMINGTON 22: The visiting Raiders didn't have the offense to keep up with the Eagles Thursday in a non-league game.

North held White Lake Lakeland to just two points in the second quarter, but it still trailed at halftime, 13-11. The Raiders managed to score only one point in the third period and saw the point differential grow to nine, 21-12.

North was without senior center Meghan Callahan, its leading scorer who suffered a sprained ankle during practice.

Jehan Hinds scored six points and Lindsey Hirsch five for the Raiders (2-3), who had nearly 30 turnovers.

"That's one thing we have to work on more," Raiders coach Tim Caruthers said. "We turned the ball over way too much."

BRIGHTON 62, HARRISON 38: The Hawks remained winless (0-5) after losing a non-league game Thursday to the host Bulldogs.

Brighton was six points better in the opening quarter and led by seven at halftime, 19-12. After an even third period (13-13), the Bulldogs finished with a 20-11 advantage in the fourth.

Maggie Condoni was high scorer for Harrison with 12 points. Kriston Kluka added seven and Bryanna Porter six. Brighton's Rebecca Roberts also had 12 points and Kaitlin Gouta added 10. The Bulldogs were 17-of-27 at the line and the Hawks 10-of-23.

CHURCHILL 64, FARMINGTON 35: The Chargers continued their early-season success Thursday as they spotted the host Falcons the first eight points of the game, then roared back to win.


