Moore said, "We were unable to find a leading agent who would work with us. We did sales all over the world."

Moore declined to cite the amount of money needed, calling it, simply, "signifi-

cant."
"The economy has been difficult," Moore said. "A sales downturn has been going on for 18 months. We were unable to find the money to continue. Lending agents

Southfield-based broker Signature Associates could not be reached for comment. It's difficult to find one buyer for all of the property, Richards said. Four different lot aplits are expected.
