

Farmington Harrison's lightning strike offense met Plymouth Canton's thunderous, pound-it-out ground attack Friday night in a Western Lakes Activities Association football game that lived up to its lofty pre-game hype. When the storm cleared, Harrison had carned a 45-34 victory, but Canton carned a great deal of respect — both from its opponents and the near-capacity crowd at the Centennial Park field. "Canton is a very good football team." Harrison coach John Herrington said, 'I saw it coming a couple of years ago and they've gotton better every year. They keep coming at you. The biggest play of the night unfolded with five seconds left in the first quarter and Canton leading, 7-0. Facing a fourth-and-13 from its own 17. Harrison lined up in punt formation.

However, instead of kicking the ball away, punter Drew Stanton — who doubles as the Harrison quarterback — hit a wide-open Agim Shabaj with a pass near mid-field. The speedy senior, wideout caught the ball and outraced, four defenders to the end zone, tying the score at 7-7.

"It wasn't a play we called in the huddle," Herrington said. "But if Drew sees no one is lining up on Agim, het has the option to throw the ball to him. He made a nice pass and Agim did the rest."
