

Lady Crusaders off on right foot; men continue to struggle

COLL. SOCCER

Madonna University's women's soccer team opened its Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference season with a dominating offensive performance that resulted in just one goal — which, fortunately, was enough to carry the Lady Crusaders to a 1-0 win over Cornerstone Tuesday at Farmington's Founders Park.

The game's only goal came with just 8:07 left to play. Susanah Bryant scored it, finishing a play started by Megan Thiry. Thiry dribbled the ball into the right corner and, from the end line, threaded a pass to Becky Guibord, who sent the ball to Bryant in front for the game-winning goal.

The win boosted Madonna to 3-2 overall, 1-0 in the WHAC. Cornerstone is 3-4 overall, 0-1 in the conference.

The Crusaders scored a whopping 33 shots on goal compared

(Farmington Harrison) assisting on both.

Barker stopped all four shots she faced in goal to earn the shutout for Madonna. Meghan Cox faced 15 shots in goal for Trinity.

The Crusaders' match last Friday at Indiana Wesleyan University was canceled for the national day of prayer for the terrorist attacks earlier in the week.

Madonna men slide

Madonna's men's soccer team entered the season with high hopes, but those hopes took a major blow when Salvatore Piraine, who became the school's all-time goal-scoring leader when he registered the only marker in a 1-0 win over Saginaw Valley State in the season-opener Aug. 28, was lost for the season with a torn quadriceps muscle.

The Fighting Crusaders have struggled on offense, losing five of their last six matches, including a pair last weekend.

On Saturday, Florida Southern scored three second-half goals to pound out a 4-1 win over Madonna in Lakeland, Fla. On Sunday, the Crusaders found themselves on the losing end of a shootout with Rollins College in Winter Park, Fla., falling 6-5.

In the loss to Rollins, at least Madonna displayed some offensive prowess, something that had been missing in three of its previous four matches, a stretch in which the Crusaders scored just two goals. Patrick Griffin, a sophomore from Redford Central and Plymouth, accounted for three Madonna goals, two of them coming in the final 8:03.

Rollins improved to 5-1 with the win; Madonna fell to 2-5.

The match was tied at 3-all at

the half, Rollins' Adrian Nunez scoring first at 4:21 before Griffin knotted it at 6:55 following a corner kick by Nick Szczecowski (Plymouth Salem).

Nunez's second goal put the Tara back on top at the 9:52 mark, but Madonna evicted it on a goal by Szczecowski at 17:58. Martin Heckmann regained the lead for Rollins at 29:14; Matt Koonitz (Livonia Stevenson) tied it again for the Crusaders with 4:10 left in the half, with Griffin assisting.

Rollins put the victory on ice, or so it seemed, with three goals in a 7:23 span of the second half, Clayton Chesarek (who had two assists in the first half) getting two of them and Peter Hitchcock collecting the third.

Madonna didn't surrender, however, thanks to Griffin's two goals, the second narrowing the gap to 6-5 with 5:09 to play (assisted by Szczecowski). However, the Crusaders could not get the equalizer.

Doug Koonitz (Plymouth Canton) faced 14 shots and made eight saves in goal for Madonna. Justin Corrado also had eight saves in goal for Rollins.

Saturday's game at Florida Southern was a bit more tranquil — only five goals were scored. Madonna got the first, from Mike Healy just 7:23 into the match. Szczecowski assisted.

The Crusaders' load didn't last. Alex Myers knotted it for Southern at 16:55 following a Trevor Clark free kick, which is the way the half ended; in the second half, goals by Clark, Jon Odum and Adam Lonnoun made winners of Southern.

Matt Strabbing (Plymouth Canton) made four stops in goal for Madonna; Johan Linell had four saves in net for Southern, which improved to 6-1.

Please Take Notice that the Board of Education, pursuant to a directive from the Intermediate School Board of Oakland Schools Intermediate School District, Michigan, has called a special intermediate school district election to be held in the district on Tuesday, September 25, 2001.

THE POLLS OF ELECTION WILL OPEN AT 7:00 O'CLOCK, A.M., AND CLOSE AT 6:00 O'CLOCK, P.M.

The following propositions will be submitted to the vote of the electors at the special intermediate school district election:

I. **SPECIAL EDUCATION MILLAGE PROPOSAL**

This proposal will increase the levy by the intermediate school district of millage for special education previously approved by the electors.

Shall the limitation on the annual property tax rate previously approved by the electors of Oakland Schools Intermediate School District, Michigan, for the education of persons with disabilities be increased by 1.1704 mills (\$1.1704 on each \$1,000.00 of taxable valuation); the estimate of the revenue the intermediate school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in calendar year 2001 is approximately \$55,646,384 from local property taxes authorized herein?

II. **VOCATIONAL EDUCATION MILLAGE PROPOSAL**

This proposal will increase the levy by the intermediate school district of millage for area vocational-technical education programs previously approved by the electors.

Shall the limitation on the annual property tax rate previously approved by the electors of Oakland Schools Intermediate School District, Michigan, for area vocational-technical education programs be increased by .2279 mill (\$0.2279 on each \$1,000.00 of taxable valuation); the estimate of the revenue the intermediate school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in calendar year 2001 is approximately \$10,816,783 from local property taxes authorized herein?
