After forcing a Salem three-and-out, Farmington advanced the ball to its own 37 before Rock defensive back Matt Trublowski picked off a Walsh pass and returned it to midfield.

Led by linebacker John Early and Hall, Salem's defense stiffened over the final five minutes and didn't allow the Falcons another first down.

Covington accounted for almost two-thirds of Salem's offensive output (261 total yards), churning out 162 yards on 26 carries. Junior running back Jason Lewis rushed for 34 yards on just four carries while quarterback Scott Hewitt grounded out 30 yards on 11 attempts.

Walsh was the big gun for the Falcons, completing 9-of-18 passes for 144 yards and two touchdowns. Picard hauled in three passes for 82 yards.

Salem limited Farmington's running game to just 14 yards on 21 carries.

Raiders tumble

The stage is set for a showdown in the Lakes Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association.

Westland John Glenn's football team improved to 4-1 overall and 3-0 in the Lakes with a 21-

12 victory Friday at North Farmington.

Glenn travels this Friday to face Walled Lake Central (4-1, 3-1) in a battle for first place.

Meanwhile, the Rockets need a pair of third quarter touchdowns to subdue the stubborn Raiders (1-4, 1-3).

Loading 14-6 at halftime, Glenn opened up a 16-point cushion when sophomore DeAnthony Granberry scored on an 11-yard run followed by Tony Davis' 5-yard TD run.

Andrew Peiffer's interception and 27-yard return set up Granberry's touchdown. Glenn picked off three passes on the night as Will Massey and Granberry intercepted one each.

Glenn scored with 8:10 left in the opening quarter when Brian Czekiewicz threw a 19-yard TD pass to Andrew Peiffer, the latter who converted the first of his three extra points.

North got on the board in the second quarter when rich Hegstrom hit Marcus McComb with a 6-yard TD pass.

The Raiders scored again in the final period with 5:18 to play on Hegstrom's 44-yard toss to Brian Johns.

Hegstrom was 13 of 27 for 118 yards, but the Raiders were limited to 73 yards on 23 carries

and 10 first downs.

McComb had five catches for 50 yards, while Johns had three for 60.

Granberry finished with 91 yards in 16 carries, while Davis added 72 yards in 11 carries. Czekiewicz was three of 11 for 37 yards and one interception (by McComb).

Defensively, senior inside linebacker Justin Kasporis was in on 14 tackles. Johns had eight from his safety spot and McComb six.

"The kids played well coming into halftime, they fought hard," North coach Rich Burrell said. "The third quarter Glenn kind of jumped on us."

Hawks survive turnovers

Some wags are saying the only team good enough to beat Farmington Harrison this year is Farmington Harrison.

But even that might not be true. Harrison survived five turnovers Friday night and still came away with a 33-0 victory over visiting Livonia Churchill in a Western Lakes Activities Association game.

If the undefeated Hawks can snake one more win out of their schedule, they'll qualify for the playoffs.

The Chargers (1-4, 0-3) held

the Hawks (5-0, 3-0) scoreless through the first period but Harrison scored twice in the second quarter, with quarterback Drew Stanton completing touchdown passes of 7- and 39-yards to Terrell Mayberry.

Stanton hit Agim Shabaj with a 26-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter for a 21-0 lead and junior tailback Marcus Woods zipped 73 yards to score on the second play of the fourth quarter.

Junior fullback Kevin Zerbo rounded out the scoring with 8:26 to play with an 8-yard touchdown run.

Woods was 17-for-171 rushing while senior split end Mayberry caught four passes for 79 yards, blocked a punt and intercepted a pass.

Stanton was 9-for-14 for 150 yards and Shabaj caught three passes for 65 yards.

Junior Tristen Thomas led Churchill with 55 yards rushing on 21 carries.

Defensively, cornerback Derek Dodd intercepted two passes for the Chargers and Andrew Ribar made a pick in the end zone when it was 21-0. Churchill also recovered two Harrison fumbles.

Quarterback Mark O'Hara of Churchill went 4-for-17 for 37 yards with an interception.
