## Dog park has temporary home

The dog park has found a temporary home.

Mark Gordani, owner of Grooming Tails in Farmington Hills and the Orchard Lake Pet Resort in Southfield, said a first dog park session would happen on 10 fenced acres of his Farmington Hills home today.

"The cause is worth it," he said.

Sept. 18 marked the last day that local dog park enthusiasts used soccer fields at North Farmington High School as an unofficial dog park. The dog lovers, headed by the group Parks for Urban Pups, met from 8:30-9:30 a.m. during warm weather at the site for nearly two years.

But the group agreed to abandon the school property after

Farmington Public Schools Superintendent Bob Maxfield asked them to, in a letter.

The group, which has members in Farmington Hills and West Bloomfield, continues to seek a city-sponsored park.

"We have customers that have been going to the temporary dog park," Gordani explained. After visiting the temporary park, "I was very impressed with the people, and how the dogs behaved. I was also very disturbed with how the city has been belligerent with the people."

Saying he expects trouble from the city over the private dog park, Gordani declines to publicize his address or phone number. He previously filed a \$10 million lawsuit against the city over matters related to a home fire and alleged harassment.

"We're only going with the core group. We understand people

may come and go; we do have to be mindful of the neighbors."

Gordani outlined plans for the temporary dog park to the Farmington Hills city council Sept. 10. On the subject of a city-sanctioned dog park, Mayor Nancy Bates told him, "Council is waiting for the group to come with us for a proposal."

PUPS organizer Jess Elson said he had already presented a written proposal to the city.

Gordani said, "If they're (Farmington Hills) building a \$10 million expansion of San Marino Golf Course with as little enthusiasm as that generates around the community, they could fence off an acre at Heritage Park at minimal expense for a dog park."

"It's like Jess Elson said at the council meeting, a lot people in Farmington Hills own pets. This issue is not going away," he said.
