NORTHVILLE 48, HARRISON 45: Farmington Harrison made an attempt to catch visiting Northville in the fourth quarter Tuesday but fell short of accomplishing a come-from-behind win.

The Hawks trailed by eight points, 31-23, going into the finale but outscored the Mustangs by seven in the last eight minutes, 22-15.

Ayana Richmond scored 20 points and Victoria Christman 12 to lead Harrison. Jessica Condon and Christman had seven rebounds each, and Richmond made eight steals.

The Hawks, who are 2-1 in the WLA and 2-7 overall, played without center Maggie Condon and Merrill DeRose. Condon was ill and DeRose was being rested after being involved in a car accident.

Kelly Anderson and Lauren Temple netted 11 points apiece to pace Northville, 2-1 in the WLA and 5-2 overall.

The Mustangs, who led 17-12 at halftime, made 22 of 37 free throws, the Hawks 18 of 34.

SALEM 44, W. FARMINGTON 38: The Rockets jumped out to a big lead at the start Tuesday and coasted to a win over the visiting Raiders in a WLA basketball game.

"We really had a pretty good defensive series at the start of the game," Salem coach Fred Thomann said. "It was 16-1 with about four minutes to go in the second quarter. That put the game in hand at that time."

Mary Lou Liebke scored 17 points and added 10 rebounds for the state-ranked Rockets, who are 3-0 in the league and 7-0 overall.

Stephanie Phillips scored nine points and Kelly Jasot added eight with five assists. Salem held a 20-7 halftime lead.

Meghan Callahan led the Raiders with six points. Catherine Audette had five steals and played well defensively. North coach Tim Carruthers said, "The Raiders are 0-2 and 3-5."

HARRISON 55, FARMINGTON 47: The Hawks used a strong third quarter to build a lead Saturday and fought back a rally by the first Falcons in the fourth to win their second straight game.

The contest had been postponed from Sept. 11 following the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

"It was a big win, to go on the road at Farmington and get that," Harrison coach Pete Mantyla said. "They have a number of players back, and we're a little younger than we have been in the past."

"Farmington has a good mix of veteran players and they play hard," Ayana Richmond scored 16 points to lead the Hawks, but she had plenty of support from Stephanie Zak (14) and Maggie Condon (12).

Condon also had 10 rebounds and Jessica Condon seven. Richmond had five steals.

Having Richmond back in the lineup after recovering from an ankle injury "has been a big boost," according to Mantyla.

"She provides a lot of leadership," he said. "She takes care of the ball,

makes open shots and runs the rules at the front of our press better than anyone else we have."

"We had another real solid effort for points and rebounds," he added.

"We're starting to develop some people other than Maggie and Ayana who can score for us. If we can get a third girl in double figures, that's a big help for us."

Farmington's Randin Brown scored a game-high 18 points. Julie Kimmel tossed in 12 and Brittaney Coleman 10.

Harrison outscored Farmington in the first quarter, 19-17, and the Hawks maintained a two-point lead through halftime, 29-27.

They used a 16-8 advantage in the third period to open a lead, and Harrison was ahead by 14 with six minutes remaining in the game.

The Falcons got within five points with a minute and a half left before the Hawks halted their rally.

"It was a matter of Farmington doing things right and us doing things wrong," Mantyla said. "We rushed a lot of shots on offense and turned the ball over. We fouled them a number of times and were stopping the clock."

Kristen Kluka and Zak scored five points apiece in the fourth quarter, including one three-point basket for each.

Zak helped get the Hawks going early, scoring nine points in the opening quarter. She also had three rebounds, converting two for baskets.

"At the time Farmington was outplaying us," Mantyla said. "She came off the bench and gave us a spark."

"I was most pleased with the fact she went hard to the offensive glass and got putbacks. We know she can make perimeter shots."

The Falcons made 19 of 30 free throws, the Hawks 12 of 27.

tradition passed on from year to year by team captain. Fracassa made him one of the most recognizable names on the Michigan high school football scene.

"I never started to think about the record until a couple of years ago, and then I thought maybe I could get it if I didn't retire," says Fracassa, who reached his 300th victory in a first-round state playoff victory over Southfield last fall.

"This record tells me a story about a football coach who's been around a long time. It also reveals that I've had some pretty good teams and players over the years."

"When I got it, I will think about all the great kids who have helped me achieve it. They were wonderful."

"It will be nice when I get it and I will enjoy it for a year or so. But I probably won't have it for long, because there are some younger coaches coming along (Tom Mach at CC and John Harrington at Farmington Harrison) who have a lot of wins."

Fracassa managed to keep Mach from another victory in Sunday's Boys Bowl.

The Warriors scored touchdowns in each of the first three quarters and held a 21-7 lead at one point. However, the Shamrocks converted an interception into a touchdown to make it 21-14.

Then, with just seconds remaining in regulation time, CC had the ball deep in Rice territory but was unable to score. A pass into the end zone fell incomplete.

"I think our defense did a great job," Fracassa said. "We

stopped them four times down there in that last quarter. Our defense really had to come up with some game-saving tackles and plays."

Junior Anthony Jackson paced the Brother Rice offense with a pair of long touchdown runs (62 and 24 yards). Al Gioutos scored on a 3-yard run.

The CC touchdowns were scored by Derrick Brooks on a 3-yard run and Ryan Rogowski on a 14-yard pass from Tom Jakacki.

Brother Rice finished with 225 total yards, including 150 rushing. Jackson, who started the season at wide receiver but appears to be the starting tailback at this point, finished with 20 carries for 130 yards. Sophomore quarterback Doug Pickens completed eight of 22 passes for 75 yards.

"It was close all the way," Fracassa said. "You have to play hard against them every second, and I think we did play hard."

The Shamrocks had 231 yards, with Brooks leading the way on the ground with 76 on 18 carries; Mike Banaszak had 42 yards on nine carries.

Jakacki was 7-for-26 passing for 114 yards. Rogowski had three receptions for 67 yards, and Wroblewski returned five punts for 72 yards.

CLARENCEVILLE 49, RIV. RICHARD 9: Opponents continue to fall like bowling pins against Clarenceville's team.

On Friday, the host Trojans ran their record to 5-0 by mowing down non-league foe Riverview Gabriel Richard, 49-0. The Trojans led 35-0 at halftime.

Clarenceville has now outscored its opponents 253-14 on the season. Senior tailback Tim Shaw, the state's

all-time career leader in touchdowns, put three more on the board against the Pioneers running his total to 102 in four years.

Griett Law of Sheridan, Ind., holds the all-time high school record with 141 from 1986-89.

Shaw finished with 145 yards rushing and caught a 79-yard touchdown pass from his brother Pete, a junior quarterback.

Senior Steve Meadows also hit a big night with two rushing TDs and picking up a fumble and returning it for 69 yards.

Pete Shaw completed six of seven passes for 182 yards and two TDs. Wide receiver Adam Carpenter had three catches for 69 yards and a touchdown.

Junior linebacker Andrew Shaw paced the defense with nine tackles. Freshman Mark Simpson, making his first start, had six tackles and a fumble recovery.

The Trojans, Division 6 state semi-finalists a year ago, have won 25 straight regular-season games dating back to the 1998 season and are 26-2 in three seasons under coach Greg Hudkins.
