

# Crusader women's soccer winners

It wasn't much of a test Tuesday for the Madonna University women's soccer team.

The Lady Crusaders, who led 7-0 at halftime, allowed just one shot on goal en route to a 10-0 victory at Concordia College.

Madonna, now 5-4 overall and 3-0 in the Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference, was led by Becky Guibord's hat trick.

Christen Shull (Plymouth Salem) added two goals and four assists.

Other MU goal scorers included Megan Thiry, Susannah Bryant, Claudia Finn, Jessica Betson, and Emily Nijendendam.

It was the first collegiate goal for both Finn and Betson. Emily Jackson (Farmington Hills Harrison) contributed two assists, while Thiry, Bryant, Nicole Allevato and Michele Vetrano (Livonia Stevenson) had one each.

Jennifer Barker (Stevenson) had to make just one save, while counterpart Jackie Waterhouse made 12 for Concordia (2-6-1, 0-3).

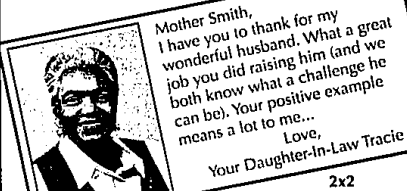
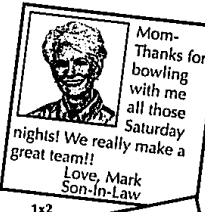

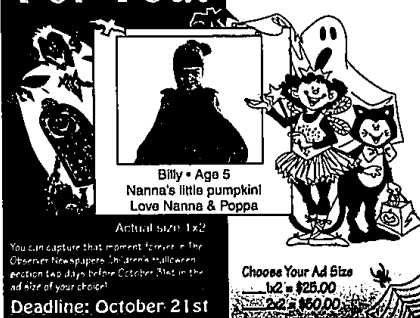
