**Falcons flattened**

The rain and Westland John Glenn had one thing in common Friday: both swept down the field relatively unchecked.

John Glenn, which hosts

Farmington Harrison in the league championship crossover game this Friday, scored twice in the first quarter to take a 14-0 lead en route to clinching a berth in the state playoffs with a 41-0 victory over Farmington.

The host Rockets scored at 7:42 when quarterback Brian Czekiewicz went over from a yard out to complete a 6-play, 30-yard drive against the Falcons (0-7, 0-5).

Then, with 37 seconds to go in the quarter, Tony Davis ran for a 20-yard touchdown at the end of a three-play, 32-yard drive. Andrew Pieffer kicked the first two of his five extra points.

With 11:34 left in the second quarter, sophomore back DeAnthony Granberry ran for a 4-yard touchdown as the Rockets (6-1, 5-0 Lakes Division) converted following a Falcons' miscue.

Farmington's punter's knee accidentally touched the ground as he was fielding the snap. John Glenn took over at the Farmington 17.

Maurice Warren took an intercepted pass 35 yards down the right sideline for a touchdown that made it 28-0 late in the second quarter.

Granberry scored on a 1-yard run with 10:10 left in the third quarter after bolting 46 yards to the 10 to put his team in position for the score.

Brandon Ajeouny, who took over at quarterback, scored on a 5-yard touchdown run up the middle with 3:33 to play, a score set up by Jeremiah Thornton's 23-yard run.

Granberry was Glenn's leading rusher with 94 yards on 15 carries.

Jeff Sutton intercepted a pass for the Rockets.

**Raiders rumbled**

Livonia Stevenson got a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown Friday night by linebacker Rob Grieson to defeat

North Farmington, 14-7.

Grisius scored at 10:17 of the third quarter, the lone tally of the second half.

Stevenson (4-3, 3-2) drove 66 yards to score in the first quarter, with Bill Marsack getting into the end zone from the 10 at 7:02. Matt Radley kicked the first of his two extra points.

The Raiders tied the score in the second quarter as quarterback Rich Hegstrom hit Marcus McComb with a 14-yard scoring pass. John Moll tied the score with the extra point.

Senior linebacker Justin Kasegrie was in on 21 tackles for North Farmington (2-5, 2-3).

Marsack ran 16 times for 34 yards while junior Matt McCowan was 16-for-66 rushing.

The Spartans won the battle of first downs, 15-7, and had 230 yards of total offense to just 68 for the Raiders.

North Farmington turned the ball over three times, twice by interception, while Stevenson's only turnover in the rain was a fumble.

Stevenson was 2-for-5 passing for 19 yards while North Farmington was 8-for-16 for 79 yards.

The Spartans ran 66-for-211 while the Raiders lost 11 yards on their 21 rushing attempts.

Ex-Falcon Karl Lopata earns a regular spot in Wolverines' starting lineup

Major college soccer is coming soon and to your own backyard.

Michigan and Bowling Green State University will square off in a Division I matchup Thursday at Plymouth Canton High School. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Admission is free.

Michigan, a second-year program, is off to a 7-1 start heading into today's game at home with defending NCAA Division I champion Indiana.

The Wolverines feature four players with Overlandfield ties — all starters — along with

assistant coach Walt Barrett, who guided Livonia Stevenson High to two state titles (1991 and 1996) and one runner-up finish (1993).

Starting goalkeeper Joe Zawacki and stopper Mike White (both Stevenson) have played key roles in U-M's early season success along with senior defender Dave George (Churchill), a transfer from Eastern Michigan University, and freshman forward Karl Lopata (Farmington).

U-M's only loss occurred Sept. 9 against Big Ten foe Penn State (4-0 setback). Last Thursday, U-M and Oakland University battled to a 2-2 draw. The

Wolverines played the entire second half with only 10 players after George was ejected for receiving two successive yellow cards.

Zawacki, one of Michigan's original scholarship players, missed the entire 2000 season with a knee injury, but has bounced back impressively this fall. In nine games he has a goals-against average of 1.08 with four shutouts.

"At times Joe looks like an All-Big Ten keeper," U-M coach Steve Burns said. "He's doing things to keep us in games. He's always in position and has been sure-handed."

Another original U-M recruit was White — who like Zawacki, George and Lopata — is a former first-team All-Observer pick.

White, a sophomore, has played stopper in U-M's 4-4-2 attack.

"Mike has to be on the field for us because he's a guy you can always count on, whether he's on the attacking half of the field or the defensive half of the field," Burns said. "He has quick feet and has the potential of becoming a complete player in the Big Ten."

Lopata, an attacking midfielder, recently cracked the starting lineup and has appeared in

Michigan's last four games.

Burns forces a good future for the former Falcon standout.

"Karl helps us go from the middle third of the field to the front third of the field," Burns said. "He has a great first touch and holds the ball well. He's good at coming back to get the ball from his teammates. He knows how to bring the other guys into the game."

"He's a good player even though he doesn't possess the goal-scoring mentality yet. But he's getting better at it."

George is one of Michigan's most experienced players after spending two years at Eastern

Michigan. He came to Ann Arbor after EMU's program was dropped.

Bowling Green is 2-3-1 overall after a 3-1 Mid-American Conference loss Friday to the University of Kentucky. The Falcons play Northern Illinois today before coming to Canton.

"Bowling Green is usually in contention in the MAC and they made the NCAA tournament a couple of years ago," Burns said. "They're composed mostly of Ohio players. And that's a strong state for soccer. We lost to them 2-0 last year and it proved to be a swing game for us in our season."

Falcons edge Patriots

Once in a while those last-second attacks pay off.

North Farmington earned a hard-fought 2-1 victory over Livonia Franklin on Wednesday night when Matt Holland scored with 23 seconds to play.

Farmington had a match scheduled Friday night against Redford Union but it was rained out.

The Raiders were pressing the attack the last 7-8 minutes of regulation against the Patriots when Holland brought down and took control of a ricochet shot from a teammate.

He beat two Patriots off the dribble to the inside and, when the Franklin goalie came out to challenge, smacked the ball under him for the game-winning score.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that any qualified elector of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan, who is not already registered to vote may register for the general November election to be held on the 6th day of November, 2001, in the City of Farmington.

Act 116, Public Act of Michigan, 1954; as amended, provides in part as follows:

The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this state, or in any district, county, township, city or village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the township, ward or precinct in which he offers to vote.

Under the provisions of Act 116, Public Act of Michigan, 1954, as amended, only persons who have registered as general electors with the appropriate Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside, or through registration at a Secretary of State Drivers license bureau, or otherwise as permitted by law, are registered electors.

The City Clerk will be at the Clerk's office in the City Hall on each working day during regular working hours until and including Tuesday, October 9, 2001, for the purpose of receiving registrations of qualified electors of the City of Farmington not already registered.

On Tuesday, October 9, 2001, which is the last day for receiving registrations for the general November election to be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2001, the City Clerk will be at the Clerk's office between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., prevailing Eastern Time, for the purpose of receiving registrations of qualified electors.

The following proposition will be submitted to the electors of the City of Farmington at the election:

**Sewage Disposal System Bonding Proposition**

Shall the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, Michigan, borrow the principal sum of not to exceed One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,800,000), payable in not to exceed 20 years from the date of issue, and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds for the purpose of paying all or a part of the cost of acquiring and constructing improvements to the City's sewage disposal system consisting generally of rehabilitation of the primary sewer interceptor pipe that connects Farmington to the Detroit Wastewater Treatment System by inserting a liner inside the current pipe together with all appurtenances and attachments reasonably necessary thereof? The estimated millage to be levied in 2002 is .34 mills (\$3.4 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and the estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds is .34 mills (\$3.4 per \$1,000 of taxable value).
