The Falcons took both parts of a three-team meet Thursday, defeating North Farmington, 24-31, and Plymouth Salem, 28-29. Salem swamped North Farmington, 22-37.

"The girls were real excited about the fact they beat both teams," said Kim Sturm, acting coach of the Lady Falcons. "A lot of the girls, when they went through their splits (times), were about on what they should have been.

"Toward the end, they guted it out. They do a lot of hill work and that shows at Cass Benton. They came in real strong."

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Although North Farmington had the individual winner in Nicole Moundros (20:15), Farmington had the next two finishers in Claire Czaplicki (20:42) and Rachel Button (20:43). Kristen Balla and Megan Annarino were also in the top 10.

Harrison unleashed its quick-strike offense Friday night in a 54-7 drubbing of visiting Livonia Franklin in a Western Lakes Activities Association game. The win set up a crossover showdown this Friday at Westland John Glenn between the Rockets and Hawks for the WLAA title.

The steady day long rain may have washed out a soccer match, but it didn't slow the Hawks football team down one scintilla.

Quarterback Drew Stanton bolted 45 yards to the end zone on Harrison's second play from scrimmage, with Mike Kloosterman giving Harrison a 7-0 lead with the extra point.

On the Hawks' next play from scrimmage, Marcau Woods flew 64 yards for a touchdown and a 14-0 leaf following Kloosterman's kick.

Franklin ran three plays and punted right to Agim Shabaj, who jetted 46 yards with the ball and a third Harrison touchdown in just four plays.

The Patriots (2-5, 1-4) notched their first first down of the game but then Terrill Mayberry intercepted a pass and made it 27-0 with a 56-yard interception return. The kick failed. ception return. The kick failed

The score went to 39-0, triggering a running clock for the second half, after Dave Condeni caught a 30-yard TD pass from Stanton and Woods scoated 28 yards for a touchdown on the first play after-junior linobackor Eric Thompson recovered a Patriots' fum-

Harrison (7-0, 5-0) moved 54 yards in five plays on the first scries of the third quarter, with Shabaj taking a 15-yard scoring pass from Stanton.

It was this kind of night for the Hawks: Shabaj fumbled the conversion snap but picked it up and ran it in for two points.

Franklin finally scored with three minutes left in the game. Senior full-back Ryan Allem of Franklin went into the end zone from the one, the 13th play of a 61-yard all-rushing drive. Andy Siefert kicked the extra point.

The scoring came to an end on the last play of the game when Harrison junior tailback Charles Pickett posted a 41-yard touchdown run. Jake Ghannam kicked the extra point.
