Livenin Stevenson and Northville were tied at 322 strokes Tuesday after the completion of the 18-hole tournament at Hudson Mills Golf Course.

That put it down to the tie-breaker — each team's fifth, usually non-scoring, competitor.

Northville's fifth player shot 81, Stevenson's 85.

Thus, the Mustangs were crowned the WLAA tournoment and overall league champions.

Northville's point total for tournament and dual-meet competition was 23. Stevenson was second with 17 and Farmington Harrison third at 16.

"It was not unexpected to have Northville win," Stevenson coach John Wagner said. "They we been strong all scasson. They have fine players.

"Stevenson's boys were lucky enough to score a 322 and tie them. Although we lost on the tie-breaker, I'm proud of my boys."

Harrison ones third in the tournament, just eight strokes behind Northville and Stevenson and one chead of Plymouth Canton.

"That's the best we've done in about 12 years," Harrison coach Bill Spencer said. "We've competing against schools that are twice our size. It's a tough league. That was a good show for us.

"I think the way the season has gone we have to be pleased up to this point, We've accomplished some of the things we wanted to accomplish."

Harrison's 330 team score was around its average for the season, so it wasn't all that unusual the Hawks should do so well.

"If' you look at our scores, we were 327 at the county, 327 at Country Day and 330 here," Spencer said. "We've been pretty consistent. You can put us out there, and were not going to vary too much."
