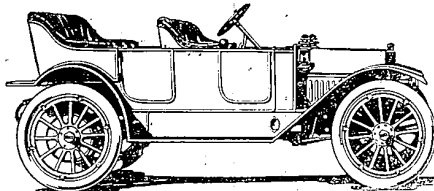

FIND GOOD WATER IN ABUNDANCE

Well Drivers Strike a Fine Bed of Gravel and Good Flow at Depth of 170 Feet

The well drivers who are drilling the wells for the city water system struck a strata of gravel a few days ago that seemed to be full of water, just what they had been looking and hoping for. It was at the depth of 170 feet that the drill tapped the gravel and immediately they had 125 feet of water in the pipe.

An attempt was made to bail or pump it out in order to see if it stood the test and if the flow was sufficient. Pumping at the rate of 40 gallons a minute on Monday did not lower the supply in the least, but when they stopped there was seven feet more water than when they began. Another attempt failed to make any impression on the supply of water and then to make a more exhaustive test a much larger pump was sent for which it is expected will settle the matter as to whether this well will be available or not.

Miss Mercy J. Hayes of Detroit, whom Farmington is proud to claim as a daughter and who is supervisor of the public schools of Detroit, gave the address on the "Public School System of that City," especially in relation to the special work sometimes designated as "fads." After listening to Miss Hayes' account of the work being done in Detroit to make efficient citizens of all classes, the rich, the poor, the mentally deficient, the deaf and dumb and the crippled children; the play grounds established for the purpose of providing places of wholesome amusement for hundreds of children whose only recourse would be the street with its contaminating influences in which to exercise the divine prerogative of childhood, namely, the right to play; the use of the schools as social centers; the manual training and domestic science classes, where the boys and girls are trained in vocational work, her hearers were ready to acclaim, "If these be fads give us more of them." Miss Hayes used lantern slides to illustrate her lecture, which very much enhanced the interest of her subject.

Piano music was furnished by our young musicians, Miss Helen Warner, Miss Ernestine Pierce and Murray Moore, while Miss Hazel Fox, in a manner which charmed her audience, sang two beautiful solos.

When the postoffice authorities "pulled" the Standard Securities Company, alias Wisner & Company, in New York the other day, they took away with them a wagon load of nicely engraved oil and mimeo company certificates and "literature" telling how to make a budding dollar blossom into many thousands.

Among the papers gathered up by the inspectors was a list of over 100,000 names of people who have bought or might be induced to buy stocks. The inspectors call it the most valuable "sucker list" in existence. Many of the names were followed by remarks showing that the persons named had a reputation for being quick to grasp the kind of opportunity which A. L. Wisner & Co. and the Standard Security Co. advertised.

The startling fact is that these people actually sold more than two million dollars' worth of this worthless stock to the public.
