### NOTICE OF A **PUBLIC HEARING** ON INCREASING PROPERTY TAXES

The Board of Education of Oakland Schools will hold a public hearing on a proposed increase of 1.1704 mills for Special Education and .2279 mills for Vocational Education to be levied in 2001.

The hearing will be held on Tuesday, October 23, 2001 at 3:30 p.m. at Oakland Schools, 2100 Pontiac Lake Road, Waterford, MI 48328.

Following the hearing, the Board of Education, at their regular scheduled meeting will take action on the proposed additional millage.

If adopted, the proposed additional millage will increase Special Education revenues 87% and Vocational Educational revenues 60% from ad valorem property taxes over such revenues generated by levies permitted without holding a hearing. If the proposed additional millage rate is not approved the Special and Vocational revenue will increase by 5% over the preceding year's operating revenue.


